Observation

- 1:1 Haggai prophesied during the 2nd year of King Darius I of Persia (520 B.C.).
- 1:1 The 1st message: 1st day of the 6th month (Elul) is a new moon festival.
- 1:2 The people were no longer rebuilding God's temple (cf. Ezra 4:1-5).
- 1:4 But, they found time to build fine, paneled houses for themselves.
- 1:6 Their lives were filled with troubles because they were ignoring God.
- 1:8 God's command: Rebuild the temple, that I may be pleased and glorified.
- 1:9 God had cursed their lives because they had ignored His temple (cause-effect).
- 1:12 The people feared God and obeyed the message; exile had changed them.
- 1:13 God's promise: "I am with you" as you build My temple (cf. Matt 28:18-20)
- 1:14 God stirred up the spirit of the people; He motivated them (sovereignty).
- 1:15 They resumed work on the temple on the 24th day of the 6th month.

- 2:1 The 2nd message: 21st day of the 7th month (Tishri) is the last day of Tabernacles.
- 2:3 Who can remember the former temple (destroyed 66 years earlier in 586 B.C.)?
- 2:4 God's command: Be strong and work because I am with you (1Cor 3:9-10, 9:16-17).
- 2:5 God's command: Do not fear because My Spirit is among you (Acts 18:9-10).
- 2:6 God's promise: I am going to shake the heavens and the earth (Heb 12:25-27).
- 2:7 God's promise: I will fill this house with glory, the wealth of all nations (fulfilled).
- 2:8 Yahweh declares, 'The silver is Mine and the gold is Mine' (Ps 24:1).
- 2:9 The glory of this house will exceed the former (i.e., Herod the Great, Jesus Christ).
- 2:10 The 3rd message: 24th day of the 9th month is winter (Ezra 10:9, Jer 36:22).
- 2:12 God asks: Does consecrated meat sanctify anything that it touches? No.
- 2:13 God asks: Does an unclean person defile anything that he touches? Yes.
- 2:14 God concludes: The people are defiled and everything they do is defiled.
- 2:17 Take notice; up to this day, I smote you and every work of your hands.
- 2:19 Their barns were empty, and their fields were barren (i.e., poor harvest).
- 2:19 God's promise: From this day forward, I will bless you (fulfilled).
- 2:20 The 4th message: 24th day of the 9th month (Chisley) again.
- 2:21 This message is specifically for Zerubbabel, not the people.
- 2:21 God's promise: I am going to shake the heavens and the earth (Luke 21:25-26).
- 2:22 God's promise: I will overthrow kingdoms, nations and armies (Millennial).
- 2:23 God's promise: On that day, I will make you like a signet ring, Zerubbabel.

Note: Zerubbabel had let the work lapse, but he repented and obtained success.

Interpretation

Who or what is "the desired of all nations" (2:7)?

The rendering, "the desire of all nations" (KJV), has been usually understood as a messianic prophecy referring to the coming of the One desired by all nations. The trend of recent translations and commentators has been away from this personal reference to the impersonal "desired things." However, the evidence is not all one-sided, and a case can be made for retaining a personal messianic reference. Perhaps Haggai deliberately selected a term that had exactly the ambiguity he wanted in order to include both an impersonal and personal reference.¹

How did the glory of this temple exceed Solomon's temple (2:9)?

According to Jewish tradition, the second temple lacked: the ark of the covenant, the Urim and Thummim, the holy fire, the Shekinah, and the Holy Spirit (Babylonian Talmud, Yoma 21b).²

The restoration temple (this present house), Haggai said, would have a glory greater than the Solomonic temple (the former house) because during Herodian times the presence of the Messiah would adorn it (cf. Matt. 12:6; John 2:13-22).³

Why did God compare Zerubbabel to a signet ring (2:23)?

The significance of comparing Zerubbabel to a "signet ring" (a seal of royal authority or personal ownership) is clarified by the imagery in Jeremiah 22:24-25. God said that if Jehoiachin (Zerubbabel's grandfather) were His signet ring, He would pull him off His hand and give him over to Nebuchadnezzar. Possibly, Haggai was saying that in Zerubbabel God was reversing the curse pronounced on Jehoiachin... An alternate interpretation sees Zerubbabel exercising delegated authority with David during the future millennial reign of Christ.⁴

Such a ring was a costly item and may have been worn on the finger or round the neck on a chain; either way, it was always attached closely to its owner, and would never be lost or abandoned. This speaks of Zerubbabel's value to God. It seems that such rings were used to stamp the royal seal on a document; this suggests that God entrusted Zerubabbel with authority to carry out his will.⁵

Application

A sin to avoid: Israel failed to put God first (1:2).

An example to follow: Encouraging one another to do the work (1:8)

A verse to memorize: 'The silver is Mine and the gold is Mine' (2:8).

Lesson: The history of Israel is a type of the Christian church (1Cor 10:1-11).

They were building a physical temple; we are building a spiritual temple.

They were attacked by physical enemies; we are attacked by spiritual enemies.

They were cursed for ignoring God's work; woe to us if we ignore God's work.

Scriptures

Ezra 4:1 Now when the enemies of Judah and Benjamin heard that the people of the exile were building a temple to the LORD God of Israel, 2 they approached Zerubbabel and the heads of fathers' households, and said to them, "Let us build with you, for we, like you, seek your God; and we have been sacrificing to Him since the days of Esarhaddon king of Assyria, who brought us up here." 3 But Zerubbabel and Jeshua and the rest of the heads of fathers' households of Israel said to them, "You have nothing in common with us in building a house to our God; but we ourselves will together build to the LORD God of Israel, as King Cyrus, the king of Persia has commanded us." 4 Then the people of the land discouraged the people of Judah, and frightened them from building, 5 and hired counselors against them to frustrate their counsel all the days of Cyrus king of Persia, even until the reign of Darius king of Persia.

Matt 28:18 And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. 19 "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, 20 teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."
