The 2023 budget Vision & approach

- Approved by Convocation on October 27
- Represents a return to regular business operations while facing challenging economic times
- Financial focus continues to ensure that we support our corporate objectives and public interest obligations
- Incorporates ongoing savings and process improvements implemented during the pandemic.

Pressures & context

We enter 2023 facing:

- a significant increase in claims activity in the lawyer pool of the Compensation Fund
- decreased value of investments and market volatility
- high inflation rates
- new policies and programs approved by Convocation in 2022 to implement in 2023
- required ongoing maintenance for Osgoode Hall and the grounds.

The 2023 budget – overview

The budget focuses on the Law Society's core operations and serving the public, licensees and candidates by:

- investing in business process improvements
- removing reliance on high-risk legacy information technology systems
- providing support for other organizations
- anticipating transition effects on revenues or expenses
 - 2023 brings us back to normalized business activity
- delivering on Convocation-approved programs and policies
 - o creation of an online Practice Essentials Course mandatory, effective January
 - implementation of Experiential Training Enhancements.

This budget also supports essential facilities infrastructure repairs to Osgoode Hall and the grounds while respecting and maintaining the building's heritage designation.




The 2023 budget – licensee fees


- Budget years 2020, 2021 and 2022 included substantial decreases in annual fees
- Fees will increase in 2023, but remain lower than 2018 despite inflation
- Majority of increase for lawyers is related to replenishing the Compensation Fund
- Fund balances resulting from pandemic savings have been used to mitigate fee increases while ensuring that Law Society operations are not compromised.

Looking ahead to 2023



Bencher election

- In April 2023, 45 licensees will be elected to serve as benchers until 2027
- Nominations are open until Feb. 24, 2023
- The nomination package is online at LSO.ca/2023BencherElection
- A Bencher Candidate Orientation and Education course is required for those who have never previously been an elected bencher
- In March, Voting Guides will be available online
- Online voting from April 19 to April 28 results announced on May 1, 2023
- The new term commences at the May 25 meeting of Convocation.



Operational updates

Mandatory compensation

- Convocation approved a mandatory minimum compensation of \$620 per week
- This applies to lawyer licensing candidates during articling and the work placement component of the Law Practice Program.

Certified Specialist Program

- In September, Convocation suspended the winding down of this program pending further consideration by Convocation
- The Professional Development and Competence Committee is to consult on the matter, reconsider and report back to Convocation before the end of 2023.

2023 Awards

2023 Law Society Awards: Nominations open until December 16

- Each year, members of Ontario's legal professions are recognized for their outstanding career achievements and contributions to their communities
- Paralegals are eligible for the William J. Simpson Distinguished Paralegal Award
- Awards for lawyers include the Law Society Medal and the Laura Legge Award
- Both lawyers and paralegals are eligible for the J. Shirley Denison Award and the Lincoln Alexander Award
- Nominations are encouraged for members from all communities, practice areas, firm sizes and regions across the province. Visit: LSO.ca/awards-nominations.

Human Rights Award: Nominations open until December 31

- The Human Rights Award recognizes outstanding contributions to the advancement of human rights and/or the promotion of the rule of law provincially, nationally or internationally
- The award is granted for devotion to the advancement of human rights and the rule of law over a long term or for a single outstanding act of service. Visit: LSO.ca/human-rights-award.



Mandatory succession planning



The recommendation:

Made to the Professional Regulation Committee by the Trustee Services Working Group, which was established in 2021, to consider a number of proposed changes to Trustee Services and supports. That the Law Society establish a mandatory requirement for licensees in private practice to maintain a succession plan (or business continuity plan) for their professional business.

How we got here

The issue

- Trustee Services steps in where there are not appropriate arrangements for a licensee's professional business
- The number of practices that require intervention and licensees at risk of needing assistance from Trustee Services is increasing
- By the time Trustee Services gets involved, it is often too late
- Costs are rarely recouped
- That means all licensees are paying for this through annual fees.

The rationale

The Working Group identified four primary reasons for the recommendation:

- 1. protect client interests
- 2. comply with professional obligations
- 3. preserve licensee professional businesses and reputations
- 4. reduce Law Society administration and expenses.



An aging population of sole practitioners



There are approximately 9,500 lawyer and 1,600 paralegal sole practitioners.

Risen significantly in the last two decades.

Between 2005 and 2020, there was an increase of almost 240% in the number of sole practitioner lawyers over the age of 65.

Between 2010 and 2020 there was a similar increase in the number of paralegal sole practitioners (from 60 to 204) over 65.

The proposed requirement

The requirement would be supported by a full-suite of resources, such as:

- succession planning template downloadable and fillable
- increased and improved CPD offerings about succession planning and end-of-practice issues
- individualized guidance and resources.

Maintain a succession plan that includes information and adequate arrangements to allow for the handling of client property and management of the professional business including:

- appointment of a successor licensee
- passwords and means to access computers, emails and practice records
- details of, and access to trust accounts, trust funds, and other business accounts
- location of open and closed files, and client property.




