

CLUB MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: Jim and Nita Thill and the Joy of the T - by Connie Goss

"One purpose of the T-Rific T's is to get more Model T's restored and on the road" I believe my Dad, Jim Thill, Sr. helped with that goal/purpose. Both my parents loved to tour in their Model T and other restored autos....the goal to have them...be visible and on the road. Here is my version of their story.

As members of the T-Rific T's and friends of Jim and Nita Thill, you have more knowledge about the cars than I ever will, perhaps you can fill in the blanks on some of the autos in the following photos.

By default the "Joy" is to share the history, knowledge and love of the Model T. More importantly, the opportunity to ride in one through the generations. Mom was born in Frederic and Dad in Hamburg, Wisconsin. They grew up in small towns in northern Wisconsin during the 30's and 40's, my Dad in Stanley where his parents were cheese makers. (One of his earliest cars - any suggestions what it is?)



In Stanley, Dad worked for Halterman where he learned to love mechanics and all things mechanical at an early age. He was a fixer/mechanic by trade and at heart. After graduating from Stanley High School, he worked the ore boats on the Great Lakes for about a year and then returned to Stanley to start a milk route with his own truck.



On a chance visit to Eau Claire, he met Nita his sweetheart, love of his life, and accomplice in the many saved Model Ts and other antique autos they rescued through the years.

Dad was drafted during the Korean War and was stationed at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. Mom, Dad, and our oldest sister Sandi moved into a small house right next to Mount Vernon, George Washington's estate. Our second sister Linda was born in Virginia. Dad was an MP and one night while on duty at the gate, he helped a young lady in distress. She asked that he call her father. As luck would have it, an older distinguished gentlemen in his robe showed up. He was a Colonel. There was no damage to the gate but the car needed to be moved. The girl and Colonel moved the car (maybe with Dad's help). Either way the Colonel told Dad to see him tomorrow at the Engineering School. That was Dad's introduction into bulldozers and heavy equipment. A chance happening and choices made led to additional training in mechanics.

After the tour of duty in Virginia, they moved back to Ladysmith, Wisconsin where third sister Mary Ann was born and Dad started a logging truck business to support his growing family. We have had several conversations if the logging truck was a Diamond Reo or Diamond T. Different stories have the truck fun to drive, especially for a young boy trying to reach the brake pedals with the hot floor bed.

Mom and Dad eventually moved back to Eau Claire when my brothers Jim, Bob, and myself were born. Our youngest siblings Cathy and Joe came along later. Luckily, Mom and Dad both had a sense of humor. With all those kids, it was needed. This photo is of one of their first antique cars and the five kids who put sand in the gas tank. Our younger sister Cathy (not pictured) was just born and I was only three, so it wasn't Cathy or myself who did it.

Dad's education/experience in the Army with heavy construction equipment led to a job with Bark River Culvert and Equipment as a mechanic. He traveled out to the equipment at the construction sites, in fields and at farms that needed repairs. He met a lot of people and made friends along the way. Eventually this led to the opportunity to go out on his own with Thill Track and Tractor Service, out on Hwy 85 south of Eau Claire. With seven kids and Mom as a willing supportive partner, they started a full service repair shop for heavy equipment. It soon became apparent that there was a need for high quality used parts. The logical step was a salvage yard for construction equipment and eventually a nationwide network of like-minded distributors for used and new (OEM/ non-OEM) parts. Think of it as an early version of Amazon. My parents always told us if we were just standing around we were doing it wrong, find something to do like pick up a broom. As a family business, there was always something to help "do.".

Our youngest brother Joe came along which rounded us out to a total of 8 kids, a bunch of grand kids and great grandkids that have had the opportunity to share in the joy and pleasure of riding with Mom and Dad in a Model T.

This is the 1926 Model T Ford Fordor. Dad did a body off the frame restoration which he finished in 2010. It was judged first place in its class at the 2011 Rochester, Minnesota, tour of the Model T Ford Club of America International.



They participated numerous times in the annual Fall Creek parade and had many lucky family members ride along.





In addition to keeping as many Ts on the road as possible, I think my parents other motto was: find a car, save a car; share the history, pass along the history, and keep telling the story. America is great and the T is part of the story and journey.

They had the opportunity to winter in Hawaii and during their time there, came across vehicles that needed to be rescued. A favorite is the Model A coupe that they brought back and took to the Chippewa shows.

Their final barn find "aka" rescue was from Fall Creek in 2014. A lady had a 1924 Model T in her barn that needed a new home. After seeing the 1926 Fordor in the Fall Creek parade, she contacted my parents for help. Mission accomplished, the 1924 Model T was saved and found its new home with Bob Beaulieu, a fellow Model T enthusiast and mechanic who worked for Thill Track & Tractor Service for years. Recently, I was able to introduce and connect Bob to Denny Mickesh and Bill Glass for extra Model T parts that others could use to keep them on the road.



In addition to the 1924 Model T in that barn, there was a little blue "bomb" that was saved, but that is another story and another fine mess.



The 1926 Fordor was a favorite car to both Mom and Dad. When it was time to sell, they offered it to the members of the T-Rific Ts first. It found a good home in Tuscaloosa. It went with all the papers, extra parts and the original Model T tool kit to keep it on the road.

So the question could be why all the Model Ts? The answer is simple - Why not!

The Ford Model T is a history lesson and my parents loved to tell the story. They were able to live the story. The Model T is not a pile of old junk that has no meaning, it is a story to share. Through them, those fortunate enough to take the time and slow route have had the opportunity to be part of the story. The lesson is to stop and enjoy the fruits of your labors, aka work hard/play hard, save some, play some, share the fun and the stories. **Keep the history alive!**



If you share the ride and the story, it can take on a life of its own.
