The answer will always stick with me – they wanted to launch a new worshipping community because they kept losing people to the big non-denominational church down the road and they wanted to begin doing some of the same things that the "big church down the road" was doing with the hope that their own church would begin to grow again. They were hoping we could copy/paste some of the big church ideas, so that we could stop the decline in attendance.

But would that have worked? Does copy/pasting ministry from a different context to your own actually work?

Does Our Context Influence How We Live Out Our Faith?

"Now while Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, a woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment, and she poured it on his head as he sat at the table."

Matthew 26:6-7 (NRSV)

An alabaster jar of very costly ointment is the point of contention in this story.

For the woman, there is no better time to use this jar of very costly ointment than in this moment as Jesus sits at the table. What better way to honor Jesus? What better way to acknowledge him as the son of God than by pouring this costly perfume on Jesus' head to anoint him.

For the disciples, that was not the right thing to do. In their mind, the ointment should have been sold for a lot of money and the proceeds given to the poor. What better use for this oil, right? Imagine the kind of impact that money could have made to help the poor.

Both are in the same room, in the presence of Jesus, looking at the exact same alabaster jar. And yet, they both see very different possibilities when they look at that alabaster jar. Why?...
