


**Members Monthly Spotlight**

# GFWC Coco Plum Woman's Club's Volunteer of The Year Nomination

Our nomination for volunteer of the year is a past president, who does not rest on her laurels, and there are many. She participates in all aspects of the GFWC Coco Plum Woman's Club.

She has served on every fundraiser committee, Festival of Tables helping to raise

Interdisciplinary Victim Services and Education) located at the University of Miami, there are only three of these clinics in the nation, the Brunch and Broadway Committee which raised \$5,000 for the Max Gruver and migrant scholarships, she co-chaired the Jazz Concert committee which raised \$8,500 for Patches (a medical facility for children, with complex medical problems). These fundraisers also raised over \$4,500 for the maintenance and restoration of our Historical Clubhouse. She supports the fundraiser committee by attending the committee meetings, purchasing sponsorships, selling tickets, making purchases for the committee, working on decorations, even delivering the check to the recipient organization. She serves as an officer, 3rd Vice president and serves as the House Chair and is responsible for all aspects of the upkeep, maintenance and renovation of our 100 plus year old historic clubhouse. She has created a spreadsheet to track all of the equipment purchases, dates and warranties. She acquires quotes for all maintenance purchases and repairs. She works with the contractors and architects to secure permits from the City of Coral Gables ensuring that we follow the regulations of the Historical Preservation Association of Coral Gables. She has faced some massive problems in the last 6 months, replacing the main AC unit, which required changes to the in-take and out take vents. It was mandated that all the cloth wiring be replaced, which has required that all of the historical fixtures be rewired. She works on the Grants committee and helped to secure a \$5,000 grant to help defray some of the costs for the re-wiring project. She works very closely with the catering company that we use at our clubhouse. She works with the treasurer ensuring all of the contractors invoices be received in in a timely manner so they can be paid promptly.

She volunteers to drive members to club meetings and club functions as well as district and state meetings.

She is a member of the Social committee; she has hosted several socials in her home; she was on the decorating committee for the Annual Holiday party, also making and donating her famous rum balls and has attended every club social. She drove several members to Homestead FL, for a collaboration between the Social Committee and the Arts & Cultural Committee for members to attend a Mexican dinner and the play *Grease* in the restored vintage playhouse.

She has participated either by walking or donating money to all walks sponsored by the CPWC, the Max Gruver Walk, to stop hazing, St Jude Walk and the walk to End Alzheimer's. She serves on the Budget Committee and her valuable input and knowledge is invaluable at these meetings. She donated candy for Coco Plum's booth at the city of South Miami's Halloween event Safe Streets. She attended the Honor flights arriving in Fort Lauderdale airport.

She served on the membership committee and worked on the New member Champagne High Tea, donating food for this event.

She mentors new members and officers, helping them to grow in club work. Performing all of these tasks with a smile and working part time.

She is the mother of two girls and grandmother of two granddaughters and a grandson.





Remember the three "Rs" - REDUCE, REUSE and RECYCLE!

In line with our State GFWC plastics initiative, your Environment Committee will continue to collect those soft plastics that are not collected curbside in your neighborhood. Since we are having some confusion about what is being collected, we have abbreviated the list of eligible plastics to make it simpler for everyone.

#### Please continue to collect the following:

**BUBBLE WRAP** 

E-COMMERCE PLASTIC MAILING ENVELOPES (Ex: Amazon mailers)

CLEAN BAGGIES OR ZIPLOCS (remember to re-use them as much as possible)

BREAD WRAPPERS (the outside plastic only) STORE BAGS (Ex: CVS, most retail plastic bags)

#### NO biodegradable or compostable content!

**ICE BAGS** 

CASE OVERWRAPS (Ex: sodas or water bottle case wraps)

NEWSPAPER SLEEVES DRY CLEANING BAGS SIX PACK PLASTIC RINGS

Please do not include plastic yogurt cups, Styrofoam egg cartons or any plastic clamshell containers.

Check your municipality's solid waste website to determine what is being collected in your community's curbside pick-up.

Consider inviting your garden clubs or your city's sustainability department to collect these plastics as well. So far, we have enlisted two garden clubs and now the Village of Palmetto Bay will also be collecting these soft plastics that are not ordinarily collected curbside! Signs at Publix state they are recycling their plastic bags to make decking and outdoor furniture too. Great news! It is our understanding that the Village of Palmetto Bay and the City of Coral Gables will be hosting their big recycling events on April 26, 2025. Fliers are being created by these cities to elaborate on what is being collected and where. Last year, Coral Gables collected batteries, electronics, TVs, household chemicals, paint and men's clothing for Camilus House and more. Stay tuned for details.


