Suggested Memory Verses

Acts 2:36-40
Acts 22:16

Purpose: To see what the Scriptures teach about becoming a Christian.

Review: From the previous lessons, do you see that sin has caused you to miss the mark and that there is a need for forgiveness?

I. What does it take?

- A. Many people wondered, even in New Testament times, what it takes to be saved. Mark 10:17
- B. If you stood at the street corner and asked people what it took to be saved, what might they say?
- C. We must look at what the Bible says, for the Bible is the standard by which we will be judged. We will not be judged by what our church says, by what our parents believed, by what our friends think, nor by how we feel. (John 12:48)
- D. To understand how to be saved, we must know what it means to be lost. Read Isaiah 59:1-2. We are saved when our sins are forgiven. How does this happen? As the Psalmist has said in Psalm 66:16-17, "Let me tell you what the Lord has done for me."

II. What does the Bible say?

Acts 2 tells us about the first group that became Christians. Let's look at what happened to them. Why look at this example? Because a river is always purest at its beginning point, before any pollutants are added to the stream. In the same way, God's way is purest at its beginning, before it is polluted by man.

- A. Faith - Acts 2:22-24; 29-36 -Peter proclaims the story of Christ and the cross.

What is the response of the listeners? Verse 37 tells us they were cut to the heart because their sin crucified Christ. What does it mean to be "cut to the heart"?

They now had faith that Jesus was the Christ.

Hebrews 11:6 and James 2:14-19 Is faith important? Is faith alone enough?

B. Repentance - Acts 2:38

What does it mean to repent? To repent means to turn to God and away from sin; to have a change of heart, which results in a change of the will, and a change of action.

Review 2 Corinthians 7:8-11 for a look at true repentance. Repentance comes from a decision to allow Jesus to be Lord of your life. What kind of sorrow is godly sorrow?

C. Confession - Matthew 10:32

Jesus commanded that we must confess before man that He is the Christ, the Son of the living God. This good confession was first stated by Peter. (Matthew 16:13-16.)

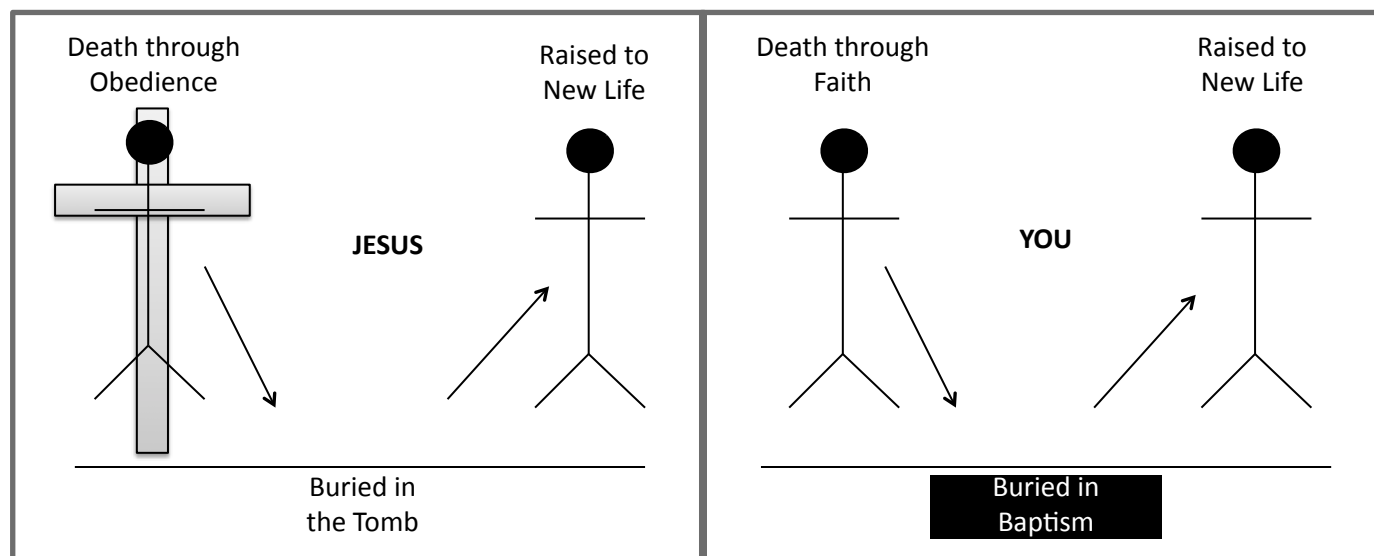
D. Baptism - Acts 2:38, 41

According to Acts 2:41, who was baptized?

Baptism is the point when preceded by faith, conviction, and repentance, our sins are forgiven and we die to our old life and get a whole new life as a child of God! Read Romans 6:1-4. "Baptism" is a transliterated word from the Greek word *baptizo* which means "to plunge, dip, or immerse." We participate in the death, burial and resurrection of Christ through baptism.
