


COMMANDERS REPORT

Greetings Post 416 family!

Hope everyone is doing well and is healthy. We were very busy last month. We completed the security upgrades, and we also completed the parking lot upgrade as well. Great improvement to the building. We will be doing some more tree work and cleanup of our property.

This time of year is where we have to have a closer eye on our legion family members. We need to make sure we do our buddy checks and make sure we look out for each other. Also, we are coming into the coldest time of year. Veterans sometimes have too much pride to ask for help, we need to know. We have our homeless and at-risk veterans committee that has key items that people might need at the ready. Please reach out to me or Mr. Bellis and/or Big Tim and Laura C for questions or help, we are there for you.

In continuing the learning I started last month, let's look at BLUE STAR FLAGS

➤ The Blue Star Service Banner was designed and patented in 1917 by World War I Army Capt. Robert L. Queissner of the 5th Ohio Infantry who had two sons serving on the front line. It quickly became the unofficial symbol of a child in the service.

➤ On Sept. 24, 1917, an Ohio congressman read the following into the Congressional Record: "...The mayor of Cleveland, the Chamber of Commerce and the governor of Ohio have adopted this service flag. The world should know of those who give so much for liberty. The dearest thing in all the world to a father and mother - their children."

➤ During World War II, the Department of War issued specifications on the manufacture of the flag as well as guidelines indicating when and by whom the Service flag could be flown, or the Service Lapel button could be worn. The Department of Defense updated the guidelines on December 1, 1967, with DoD Directive 1348.1, which implemented an Act of Congress authorizing a service flag and a service lapel button (U.S.C. 179-182). The directive was cancelled by DoD in 1970 and folded into DoD Instruction 1348.33-M, Manual of Military Decorations and Awards Program, transferring cognizance to the Dept. of the Army. It provides current guidance for the manufacture and display of both the service flag and service lapel button under the

authority of federal law. (36 U.S.C. 179 – 182).

- The Blue Star Service Banner typically displayed in windows is an 8.5 by 14-inch white field with a blue star(s) sewn onto a red banner. The size may vary but should be in proportion to the size of the U.S. Flag.
- The banner displayed in the front window of a home shows a family's pride in their loved one serving in the military and reminds others that preserving America's freedom demands much.
- The blue star represents one family member serving in the armed forces. A banner can have up to five stars, signifying that five members of that family are currently in military uniform on active duty.
- If the individual symbolized is killed or dies while serving, the star representing that individual will have superimposed on it a gold star of smaller size so that the blue forms a border. On flags displaying multiple stars, including gold stars, when the flags are suspended against a wall, the gold star(s) will be to the right of, or above the blue star(s) a place of honor nearest the staff.
- Blue Star Mothers and Gold Star Mothers organizations were established during World War I and remain active today.

➤ Blue Star Service Banners, while widely used across America during World Wars I and II, were not embraced during the Korean or Vietnam wars with nearly the same enthusiasm.

➤ The American Legion rekindled the spirit of pride in our military men and women following the horrific terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. The American Legion continues to provide banners to families in communities across the nation. Free color downloads are available at www.legion.org of the banners and static cling versions for home and automobile, as well as lapel pins, are available from The American Legion National Emblem Sales.

➤ The American Legion also has a special Blue Star Corporate Flag for government and corporate America to show their support for employees called to active duty in the war against terrorism.

The Service flag is an official banner authorized by the Department of Defense for display by families who have members serving in the Armed Forces during any period of war or hostilities the United States may be engaged in for the duration of such hostilities.

President Wilson became part of this history when in 1918 he approved a suggestion made by the Women's Committee of the Council of National Defenses that mothers who had lost a child serving in the war wear a gold gilt star on

the traditional black mourning arm band. This led to the tradition of covering the blue star with a gold star on the Service flag to indicate that the service member has died.

During WWII the practice of displaying the Service flag became much more widespread. Most flags were hand made by mothers across the nation. One of the most famous flags was that of the five Sullivan brothers who all perished on the U.S.S. Juneau.

The Blue Star Mothers was founded as a Veteran Service Organization and was part of a movement to provide care packages to military members serving overseas and also provided assistance to families who encountered hardships as a result of their son or husband serving in the war.

In 1960 Congress chartered the Blue Star Mothers of America as a Veterans Service Organization and in 1966, the Department of Defense revised the specifications for design, manufacture, and display of the Service flag.

The Department of Defense specifies that family members authorized to display the flag include the wife, husband, mother, father, stepmother or father, parent through adoption, foster parents, children, stepchildren, children through adoption, brothers, sisters and half brothers or sisters of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States. The flag should be displayed in a window of the residence of persons authorized.

The Service flag may also be displayed by an organization to honor the members of that organization serving during a period of war or hostilities.

The Service Flag is an indoor flag and should be flown facing out from the front window of the home or organization.

If the U.S. flag is also displayed with the Service flag, the U.S. flag should be of equal or greater proportions and should take the place of honor above the Service flag.

Each blue star on the flag represents a service member in active duty. A gold star is displayed if a service member is killed in action or dies in service. If several stars are displayed by one family the gold star takes the honor of being placed at the top. The gold star should be slightly smaller than the blue star to create a blue border surrounding the gold star.

Display of a Service Star Banner is done during times of war. Once again families are displaying banners at home. Blue Star Flags may be purchased through the internet, at stores, or made by hand.

Thank you for all your doing for the post and our community.


3RD VICE COMMANDER

The first "official" flag was "the Continental Colors," also known as the "Grand Union Flag," which consisted of thirteen red and white stripes and the United Kingdom's flag in the upper-left-hand corner, also known as the canton.

If you participate in any activity, take a picture, get a flyer. And explain what you did. Put it in my post mailbox, or send me the info via text, or email.

On another note. You hear info on the POW/MIA issue, but recently coming to light we have info not only on the Blue Star but also the Gold Star. My concentration will be on the Gold Star.

Briefly speaking, the Gold Star designation came from WW 1. A flag or banner was created with a Gold Star to represent a family member, relative, etc., killed while serving. At first it was a Gold Star Mother, but later was designated Gold Star Family. Either designation of the Blue or Gold Star can be obtained at the post or Emblem Sales.

Part 2: During the invasion of Normandy, many paratroopers overshot their drop zone, and landed farther inland. As they descended, some landed on a church while others were caught in trees. All of them were cut to pieces by Nazi machine gun fire. One lady called the Mother of Normandy, Simone Renaud, promised to take care of the graves of all soldiers at the Normandy cemetery.

Another person, thankful for the Allies trying to defeat the Germans, witnessed the landing. Several years later, Frenchy would

prepare a special French meal at his restaurant by Hartford. Everything was in French. Bill Pekrul, Karl Horn, and I had the opportunity to attend one of these. Frenchy passed away several years ago of bone cancer. Thank you, Frenchy, for remembering.

Even today, as many say, but can't understand the statement, Freedom is not Free. You pay a price. Our THANKS TO ALL OF YOU, BUT ESPECIALLY TO THE MANY WHO COULD NOT BE HERE. YOU WILL NOT BE FORGOTTEN. WE REMEMBER!


