#### **Stewardship Minute**

Follow The P's of Giving For A

Happy And Healthy Life

Studies have shown that generosity can lead to a happy and healthier life, but perhaps the best reason to strive to be a generous person is because God loves a cheerful giver. (2 Cor. 9:7)

Increasing your generosity financially is easier when you have a plan for saving, investing, and giving when done intentionally. Consider the FOUR P's to help you in this regard.

**PRIORITY:** Are you giving God the leftovers? We need to do the 1st Fruits Giving. Give First, save second, and spend the rest. 10-10-80 is a great formula that has always worked.

**PERCENTAGE:** What percentage would you like to give? If 10% is too much of a stretch start with a little smaller and then progressively, work it higher. Honor the Lord with your wealth and the first fruits of all your crops. (Prov. 3:9)

**PROGRESSIVE:** We can't always meet our living goals. However, by progressively increasing our giving %, we can get closer over time. Many generous givers have been known to increase their % to as much as 90% over time. Remember, you cannot outgive God! After all it's all His anyway. How much more will you give in this coming year and next?

**PROMPTED:** Never let your plan get in the way of generosity's emotional and inspirational needs. Leave room for special needs that pulls on your heart strings. Many times there are immediate hardships and special door offerings, that you can be part of the solution and befriend in that way. What causes have you recently felt prompted to support? Develop a giving strategy for finding new opportunities to experience the JOY OF GENEROSITY.

Aah, the month of April. Taxes due. Adjustment to Daylight Savings Time finally complete. My wife's birthday. Spring break concludes. Spring weather arrives? Baseball season. (Do any sports fans here remember "April in the D"?) And this year (like many, but not all) we include Holy Week and the start of the Easter season.

This is a remarkable time in the church calendar. We experience these events of Holy

Week in real time. After Advent, where we compress 2000 years of promises into four short Sundays, and Epiphany, where we cover the first years of our Lord's life and ministry in a mere few weeks, the season of Lent begins to slow us down. We take the 40 days of Lent and are reminded of our Lord's 40-day fast before He began His public ministry. Then in this last week of Lent we move into real time. Palm Sunday, our Lord's entrance into Jerusalem, begins a week-long journey which moves us to the upper room on Thursday, to Calvary on Friday, and then a three-day hiatus as our Lord is in the tomb. This was the greatest week in the history of the world, and we do well to take the time to remember each of these events.

The second noteworthy thing about this month is the sheer number of times at which we are called to gather in worship. On Maundy Thursday we remember the great gift that our Lord gave to us in instituting His supper for us. On Good Friday we gather to recall how great our Lord's sacrifice was on our behalf, and we rejoice in the life that His death brought to us. Many churches hold a service called the Easter Vigil on Saturday. Everything culminates on Easter Sunday. What a joy to be able to gather in God's house to celebrate these great blessings!

Notice, also, how all of these things point us to the greatest festival of the year. Easter Sunday is the celebration of our Lord's resurrection, the event which shows His power over sin and death and assures of our own resurrection. This season, too, is celebrated in real time, which lasts until the day of Pentecost fifty days later. This season, too, has many things for us to celebrate! Jesus, the reason for the season, is risen! Let us rejoice!

> Be with us through this season, Lord, And all our earthly days, That when the final Easter dawns, We join in heaven's praise. (LSB 418:4) A blessed April to all!


#### LARGE PRINT HYMNALS NOW IN PRINT!




