When Critical Theory and Anti-Semitism Meet



Back in June of 2023 I wrote an article entitled "Critical Theory: The Method Behind the Madness." Critical Theory is a Marxist world-view that sees history, business, politics, education, foreign policy, and much of human relations in terms of oppressed vs. oppressor. White, male, heterosexuals of European ancestry are vilified as oppressors, while women, ethnic minorities, LGBTQ, etc, are the oppressed. Critical Theory has become a favored world-view among much of the media, in colleges and universities, in American and international business, and among progressive politicians. It is behind much of the anti-American sentiment within our own borders. It's not hard to find university professors, politicians, and far-left activists who denounce the United States as an evil, racist nation founded on stolen land by exploitive capitalists and white supremacists. Yes, the U.S. has things in our past of which we cannot be proud. To our credit, however, we have ended many (if not most) of these abuses. Critical Theorists downplay the amazing advances made by Western Civilization. They ignore our systems of government and business that made this nation a 20th century economic and military superpower. Critical Theorists also have a selective memory, forgetting that conquest and subjugation have been part of world history ever since man first walked this planet. Alexander the Great did it 300 years before Christ. The followers of Muhammed conquered the Middle East and parts of Europe and Africa in the 8th and

9th centuries. Genghis Khan killed millions as part of his conquest in Asia during the Middle Ages.

On October 7th the terrorist group Hamas brutally attacked Israeli civilians, killing over 1,000 and taking hundreds as captives. If you watch or read the news, you no doubt heard how they viciously raped, beheaded, and burned victims alive. Israel has had to defend itself against numerous attacks by terrorists and neighboring nations ever since its founding in 1948. It responded to this latest attack by invading the Gaza strip to root out and destroy Hamas.

Considering how Critical Theory has infiltrated our institutions of higher education and leftleaning political circles, the result was sadly predictable. Israelis - mistakenly identified as white, European oppressors - were denounced and vilified, while the terrorists were hailed as "freedom fighters" and heros of Palestinian resistance. In the mind of the Critical Theorist, everything is evaluated in terms of oppressed vs. oppressor. What is more troubling, even disgusting, is the virulent anti--Semitism which has emerged. "From the river to the sea" is a call for the annihilation of Israel and the Jews. On college campuses Jewish students were threatened and taunted with shouts of "Zionist pigs." Protestors gathered in the streets saying that the Jews had it coming since they are colonizers and oppressors. One protestor, interviewed on TV, denied that Hamas had killed any-

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one, claiming that it was "Jewish propaganda." In December the university presidents from Harvard, Penn, and MIT were called before a congressional committee. Instead of giving a clear condemnation of anti-Semitism on their campuses, they gave vague, ambiguous answers like, "Well, it sort of depends on the context..."

Even more disturbing is the hypocrisy and double standard shown by these political and educational leaders. In colleges and businesses you can be called before a disciplinary board for simply using the wrong pronoun or saying there are two biological genders. The same people who demand "safe spaces" and "trigger warnings" for anything that might upset them turn around and call for the death of Jews. It is trendy to say things like "hate has no home here" or "everyone is welcome here." Unless, of course, you're Jewish or some other group that is labeled as an oppressor.

In December the Washington Examiner newspaper had a well-written editorial. In part it said, "One reason the (university) presidents are so confused or duplicitous about the boundaries between protected speech and unprotected, baleful conduct is that Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion regimes insist that what matters is not the actual words or actions but the group identity of the speaker. Rather than applying neutral principles to everyone, which is what the Constitution, laws, Supreme Court decisions, and common decency demand, DEI categorizes people as either oppressors or the oppressed."

As followers of Jesus Christ we see the world according to God's acts of creation and redemption. God's Law teaches that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." The Gospel tells us that "there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for all are one in Christ Jesus." Neo-Marxists instead see the world in terms of identity. Your skin color, gender, ethnicity, and lifestyle determines whether you are an oppressor or an oppressed victim. Guilt or innocence is based not on a person's actions but rather by what group they belong to. The horrible actions of a group like Hamas are excused because, in the neo-Marxist mind, the oppressed have a right to lash out and destroy their oppressors.

As God's people we believe that we are "pilgrims and strangers on earth." At the same time we are to be light and salt while we are in this world. These are troubled times in our nation. Radical activists have used the "oppressor vs. oppressed" dichotomy to divide us, create unrest, and turn people against each other. We need to be aware of threats to our freedoms and preserve the liberties handed down to us by our nation's forefathers.



Notes from the Music Director

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me,
because He has anointed Me to proclaim the good news to the poor.
He has sent Me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind,
to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim
the year of the Lord's favor."

(Luke 4:18-19)

In Luke's gospel, this quote from Isaiah is the first public statement made by Jesus. Here Isaiah briefly gives a job description for the coming Messiah:

- (1) Proclaim good news;
- (2) Give liberty to the captives (including those captive to sin);
- (3) Give sight to the blind;
- (4) Proclaim the year of the Lord.

During the season of Epiphany, we will hear and learn about how Jesus went about doing these things. Of course, we will also be singing about these things! Most of the hymns in the Epiphany section refer to several different bible stories. As you sing these hymns, challenge yourself to find the story or stories that you are singing. (Hint: our hymnal contains bible references at the end of each hymn; look these up when you get home!)

One hymn that summarizes this job description is LSB 398. How many connections between this hymn and the Isaiah passage above can you locate?



Hail to the Lord's anointed, Great David's greater Son! Hail in the time appointed, His reign on earth begun! He comes to break oppression, To set the captive free, To take away transgression And rule in equity.



He comes with rescue speedy To those who suffer wrong, To help the poor and needy And bid the weak be strong; To give them songs for sighing, Their darkness turn to light, Whose souls, condemned and dying, Were precious in His sight.

The remaining verses of this hymn describe the coming of the Magi, the establishment and growth of the kingdom of God, and the eternal nature of the kingdom. Jesus accomplished the fulfillment of all of these prophecies during His lifetime, and we recall this fulfillment during Epiphany.

As you come to church during this Epiphany season, expect to hear about prophecies fulfilled. Jesus is the promised Messiah, and His deeds and His words all demonstrate this fact.

May God bless us all as we worship Him during this season!

Stewardship Minute

WHERE ARE YOU STORING YOUR TREASURES?

Jesus spent more time talking about money and possessions than about heaven and hell combined! In fact, 15% of everything Christ said relates to this topic.

Our approach to money and possessions is central to our spiritual lives. Consider Luke 3 vs. 11-14 where John the Baptist (a forerunner to Jesus) spoke to the people about producing fruit in keeping with repentance. He provided three exhortations:

- 1) share food and clothing with those in need
- 2) to the tax collectors he said, don't collect more money than required
- to the soldiers he said, Don't extort money or accuse people falsely, and be content with your pay.

Consider many of Jesus' parables such as the widow with two small coins, or Zacchaeus's new approach to money proving that his heart had been transformed, or the rich man who spent all his wealth on himself who Jesus called a fool, who was rich on himself but not rich toward God, or the young rich man who's money was his idol and not willing to give significantly to the poor, in order to have greater lasting treasure in heaven. Jesus, of course is our #1 Eternal Treasure!

Remember this: You can't take it with you, but you can send it on ahead. According to Jesus, storing up earthly treasures isn't simply wrong. It's just plain stupid. Of course, there are many things good things God wants us to do with our money and possessions, like providing for our own family's basic and essential needs.

Remember this :Serve God by serving others. It's in the giving, that we find lasting success. Pray for wisdom on how to best serve Him with your time, talents and treasure so you may surely store up treasure in heaven.




Passion Drama
