

Epiphany

What is this thing we call "Epiphany?" The word "epiphany" means to reveal, appear, or to make known. The date of Epiphany is January 6th, and is marked by the visit of the wise men. The wise men were Gentiles, possibly from ancient Persia. Thus Jesus is revealed or made known as the Son of God who appeared to offer salvation to all people, not just the Lord's chosen Israel.

The word "epiphany" is taken from the Greek epiphaneia. This word is found in I Timothy 6:14: "keep this command without spot or blame until the <u>appearing</u> (epiphaneia) of our Lord Jesus Christ." It is also found in Titus 2:13: "While we wait for the blessed hope, the blessed <u>appearing</u> of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ."

The Epiphany season lasts anywhere from 4 to 8 weeks, depending on the date of Easter. If Easter is early (like in late March), then the Epiphany season is only 4 weeks long, because Ash Wednesday and Lent will come early too, thus shortening the Epiphany sea-

son. If Easter is in late April, the Epiphany season is longer, because Ash Wednesday does not come until March. This year Easter is April 20th, so that means the Epiphany season is a bit longer, going into the first week of March.

The theme or emphasis of Epiphany is that Christ Jesus is revealed or made known to be the Savior of all. But He is not revealed merely as a human person, like a great king or prophet. Rather, he is revealed as the Son of God. The wise men said they had come to "worship him." We do not worship humans; rather we worship God. Jesus' baptism is also part of Epiphany. At His baptism, God spoke and said, "This is my beloved Son," and the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus. Jesus did not need baptism for the forgiveness of his sins, like we do. Rather, Jesus was baptized to "fulfill all righteousness," that is, to show that He was placing himself under the Law, which He would obey in our place, and save us by His righteousness. Jesus' first miracle is one of the Epiphany lessons, where He turned water into wine at the Cana wedding feast. It is appropriate because it shows His miraculous powers and, as John 2 notes, "He thus re**vealed** his glory and his disciples put their

The visit of the wise men is usually the Gospel lesson for Epiphany Sunday. Their visit is significant because the wise men were Gentiles. (That is, they were not Jews, not descendants of Abraham.) Many of the Israelites looked down on the Gentiles as pagans and idol worshipers. But here we see God's great love: He sent His Son for the Gentiles because He loves them too! The Israelites had all the advantages of being God's chosen people. God revealed His Law (Commandments) to Israel. God raised up prophets and priests to teach, instruct, and sacrifice for Israel. God gave them the beautiful Temple in Jerusalem, where Jesus frequently taught. But that doesn't mean God forgot about the Gentiles. Frequently in the Old Testament God said that the coming Messiah "would be a light unto the Gentiles" and that "nations (Gentiles) would come to your light and kings to the brightness of your dawn."

In the coming weeks of the Epiphany season we will hear more of how Jesus is revealed as the Son of God, the Savior of both Jew and Gentile who believe. Jesus turns water into wine; He teaches at the synagogue in Nazareth and says that He has fulfilled the words of the Old Testament; Jesus drives out evil spirits; He shines with divine glory, standing with Moses and Elijah. As we hear these accounts think about how God's Son is revealed (*epiphaneia*) to us!

Lutheran for Life's Sanctity of Human Life Sunday

will be observed in Lutheran churches across our nation on Sunday, January 19, 2025. This year's theme is "Life Shines in Darkness," based on John 1:4-5:"In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

A special door offering will be collected on Life Sunday and Wednesday, January 22, for Lutherans for Life and Focus on the Family's Option Ultrasound. Both of these prolife organizations work with families giving them HOPE that is only found in our newborn Savior Jesus. Please plan ahead for these mission opportunities and pray for the efforts of Life Sunday.

No one can doubt or deny that we dwell in darkness. Sinfulness has broken humankind and left the world wrecked around us. Danger and despair, deception and dysfunction abound. Sanctity of life situations like surprise pregnancy or terminal diagnosis confront us with uncomfortable realities. Serious and genuine threats emerge: pain and labors, poverty and obligations, abandonment and abuse, disgrace and sacrifice. The voice of the devil, the spirit of this age, and the weakness of our flesh tempt and pester us to use death as the solution to the difficulties.

Yet the darkness reaches deepest right before the dawn. And shadows only show up where the light arrives. The hour has come to wake from slumber because the daylight is at hand (Romans 13:11-12).

The incarnate and crucified Son of God, our humble and gentle Lord, our risen and forgiving Savior radiates the light of life in the unlikeliest of places. The Almighty Father creates, redeems, and calls every human life special, precious, and priceless, no matter what age, appearance, or ability, from fertilization to forever. He delivers blessings of truth and love, joy and hope, community and purpose,

grace and faith even in humanity's shortcomings. In Him is life, and this life is the light of all humankind (John 1:3).

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light (Isaiah 9:2). Jesus Christ has conquered death and brought life—both immediate and immortal—to light (2 Timothy 2:10). God bless our Gospelmotivated voice For Life, for it shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it!

conversation and advocacy that displays both courage and compassion to warn and win over.




