Once again another year has passed and the New Year is just around the corner. I thought about starting this article with a rambling discourse on “the significance of the passage of time” like a semi-famous politician tried to do, but I’ll spare you!

We have a number of important events, celebrations and, yes, some challenges ahead of us. We look forward to:

Our 175th Anniversary!

Many of us remember the spectacular 150th Anniversary and all the fun events: the parade; our Christmas Concert which was broadcast nationwide on the U.S. Farm Report; starting the Passion Drama; the historical displays; burying the time capsule; visits from former pastors, teachers, and others; and visits from dignitaries from the Synod. We have a 175th committee in place, and they have already met several times to plan upcoming events. Al Rodammer has agreed to chair this committee.

Calling another Pastor

Recently several people asked me, “Does our congregation really need two pastors?” I realize that calling a pastor is a time-consuming process and an added expense to our budget. But permit me to make a comparison with the two churches I served in Kansas. My two churches in Kansas had a total of about 225 members. St. Michael’s has approximately 1,300 members. When I was in Kansas I had 6 or 7 elderly people who were shut-ins or in a nursing home. At last count St. Michael’s has 23 who are shut-ins or in a nursing home. Back in Kansas I had 4 or 5 funerals a year. In the last five years St. Michael’s has averaged about 20 funerals a year. In Kansas I had Catechism class once a week, and there were a few years where I didn’t have a class because no students were in that age group. At St. Michael’s I have Catechism class three times a week, and we are able to teach both 7th and 8th grade when we have two pastors. After Pastor Gadeken retired we had Rev. Larry Courson as an interim

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pastor. His ministry was a real blessing to St. Michael's. But after he left I was largely on my own in 2022, 2023, and half of 2024. It was very difficult to do just about everything by myself. We need to start thinking about a call committee when we turn the calendar to 2026.

Continuing to strengthen our School and Child Care.

Ten years ago we had about 125 students enrolled at St. Michael's. This year our enrollment is around 160. God has blessed us with the opportunity to give more and more young people a Christian education! In our Child Care we have over 200 total who attend, and for many of them this is the first time they hear about Jesus our Savior.

175 years of ministry is a remarkable milestone! Furthermore, it is evidence of our Lord's promise that, *“My word shall not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it.”* Jesus also said, *“On this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it.”* No matter how many years go by we have His assurance that the Gospel will still be preached, the Church will grow, and Christ Jesus will keep us steadfast in our faith until He returns in glory!


Athletic Department


