The Divine Call

We are at an important juncture in our ministry here at St. Michael's. Mr. Chaveriat has accepted the call to serve as principal at Central Lutheran School in Rochester, MN. We are in the process of calling a new music director. Mr. Eyster is retiring at the end of the school year, and we welcome Jennifer Smith as a new teacher this fall. With that in mind, I'd like to explain why we extend "divine calls" to our pastors and teachers. Does the Bible speak of a divine call? What does it mean? How is it different from a secular occupation? Those are all excellent questions.

First of all, the office of Pastor is instituted by God. God established the holy ministry (along with the auxiliary offices of Teacher, Missionary, Director of Christian Education, Director of Parish Music, etc) to carry out the public preaching and teaching of the Gospel and the administration of the Sacraments. Ephesians 4:7-13 states *"But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it...It was He who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers to prepare God's people for works of service..."* Acts 20:28 says, *"The Holy Spirit has made you overseers."*

The ministry of the Gospel is different than all secular occupations (accountants, nurses, carpenters, mechanics, etc) because ministers carry out "the

affairs of the church...especially those whose work is preaching and teaching." (I Timothy 5:17) That's why we say our church workers are not merely hired but rather called, because this is a sacred work.

Does this mean that pastors and teachers are holier than everyone else? Do they make up a class of super-Christians? Not at all! While St. Paul says that the ministry is a "noble task" and that ministers should be "above reproach," that does not make them better than anyone else. *"For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."* (Romans 3:23) That includes church workers. All of us "daily sin much" as Luther wrote in the Catechism. The "holiness" of the holy ministry does not come from the men and women who fill its offices. Rather, it is called "holy" because God has established it as His work of proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Furthermore, each congregation has the authority to call its own pastors and teachers. Acts 6:1-6 says the whole church in Jerusalem chose a group of deacons to carry out part of the ministry there. Also, in II Corinthians 8:19 St. Paul refers to an unnamed pastor or elder as being *"chosen by the churches to accompany us."* That's why each congregation - not the Synod or some other person or group - can chose to call its pastors and teachers.

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Notice that the divine call comes through the church. While a person may believe that God wants him or her to serve as a church worker, that inner feeling is not the same as a divine call. Our Lord Jesus Christ said, *"The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest to send workers into His harvest field."* (Matthew 9:37-38) A young man or woman may believe that this is where God is leading them and, after the proper training and education, they are then eligible to receive a call. (Of course, sometimes we extend a contract to a teacher if that person does not have the necessary credentials through our Lutheran Church.)

Now for some practical issues. How does a pastor or teacher decide whether to accept or decline a call? They should prayerfully consider the needs of their current church or school, along with the church/school that has just called them. A call to a new position does not invalidate or cancel the current call! Both must be equally considered. Church workers should seek the advice of church leadership and other pastors or teachers, along with denominational leaders, to determine where their gifts and talents could best be used. They can also consider the needs of their families, such as their children's education, health issues, and so on. While a church worker should never make a decision based solely on money, the congregation should make sure that adequate salary is provided, for *"the Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should receive their living from the Gospel."* (1 Corinthians 9:14)

Because this is a sacred work, every call should be given serious consideration. Calls should not be accepted or declined simply because "it's too cold there," or "I don't like that part of the country," or "this call could be a stepping-stone for a better position." Likewise, a call to a new location should never be used as a bargaining chip to get a change in a job description, an increase in salary, more vacation time, etc. Church workers hurt the reputation of the ministry when those things happen.

When a church worker receives a call, it is important that they tell the congregation, preferably at the next worship service. In the secular business world you don't have to inform your employer that you are looking for a new job. But in the Church we must be transparent. A divine call is a sacred agreement to carry out the Lord's ministry. If a church worker receives a call to another church or school, his/her current church should be notified so they can offer encouragement and pray for the worker.

At St. Michael's we have been blessed with many faithful workers over the years, and the ministry of both Mr. Chaveriat and Mr. Eyster is appreciated and will be missed. May the Lord be with them in their future endeavors, and may He grant us new workers for His harvest field!

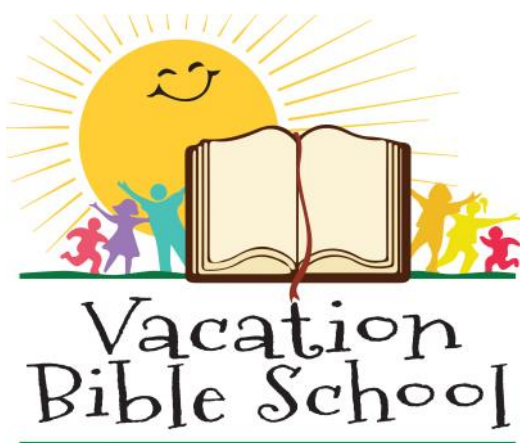
