



"Questions of the Passion"

The Lenten season is here, a bit earlier than usual. Because the date of Easter changes, Lent can begin anywhere from early February to early March. (More on that in a minute.) Lent is a time in the church year when we turn our attention to Jesus' suffering and death. As we consider all that our Savior endured - betrayed by Judas, abandoned by His disciples, arrested under the cover of darkness, pushed through a trial by prejudiced enemies, and disposed of by a Roman governor who was more interested in keeping the peace than administering justice - we remember that Jesus went through all that to save us. Our sins are the cause of Jesus' pain and misery. Our sins moved Him, out of love for us, to enter human time and space where He 'took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows," for He was "stricken by God, smitten, and afflicted, pierced for our transgressions and crushed for our iniquities." Jesus paid that awful price we could not pay to reconcile us to God and open the doors of God's eternal kingdom of life, peace, and joy.

Because this is such an important time in the church year, we have special Wednesday night Lenten services. This year our theme is "Questions of the Passion." Each Wednesday night we'll look at a different question, asked either by Jesus or by those who were around Him. Here is our schedule for the coming weeks:

We will also follow this same theme for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday later this month.

Now, back to the question as why the date of Easter keeps changing. First of all, we remember that Jesus' trial, crucifixion, and resurrection all happened in the spring of the year, at the time of the Jewish Passover. So that gives us a place to start. So why don't we just celebrate Easter 3 days after Passover? Because we no longer follow the Jewish calendar. Passover was on the 14th day of the month of Nisan. But we don't go by the Jewish months anymore. So at the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. (the same gathering that *(Continued on page 2)*

Prolife supporters: Your help is requested by former Planned Parenthood clinic director Abby Johnson. She knows "insider" information that they don't want you to know. Abby is exposing more of Planned Parenthood's secrets in her latest film Unthinkable which is being released in March. Her goal is to change the hearts and minds of abortion industry workers. Unthinkable has the power to dismantle Planned Parenthood by exposing even more of what's happening within the abortion vendor's walls -

and how much worse things have gotten since she left nearly 14 years ago. Approximately 3,000 people still work in the abortion industry. Changing the hearts and minds of abortion industry workers is how they hope to topple the abortion "Goliath". Planned Parenthood is fighting hard to ensure this movie is buried along with their secrets. Abby Johnson started And Then There Were None – the only organization that works to dismantle the abortion industry from the inside out - to encourage and empower abortion industry workers to walk out and speak out against Planned Parenthood. To reach those workers and have the impact we need to deal the final blow to Planned Parenthood, Abby needs a few things from pro-life Americans. First, she needs your prayers. With the damning information in Unthinkable, Abby expects even more to leave. Also call your local movie theater and ask that they show the film when it's released this March. Finally any financial gift would also help And Then There Were None partner with movie theaters to bring Unthinkable to as many cities as possible. All of their work - from empowering workers to leave to launching powerful movie exposés like Unplanned and Unthinkable – boils down to one thing: making abortion unthinkable. 


