## Mid-Week Lenten Worship The Seven Deadly Sins



You are invited to once again follow our Savior's footsteps to the cross this Lenten season. Lent is a special time of the church year when we especially turn our attention to Jesus' suffering and death. During the rest of the year, of course, we worship, preach, and teach about a suffering and crucified Savior. But Lent is unique in that this is a somber and serious time of repentance and reflection on all that Jesus did for us in His final weeks leading up to Good Friday. Many of our favorite hymns are Lenten ones: "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "Go to Dark Gethsemane," "Stricken, Smitten, and Afflicted," and many more. We

remember the 30 pieces of silver and the rooster crowing, marking Peter's denial. Our Passion Drama, attended and witnessed by thousands of people over the years, brings the story to life.

This year we are looking at the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ through the Seven Deadly Sins. The Seven Deadly Sins were first listed back in the 6<sup>th</sup> century as a warning to God's people. While all sins separate us from God, these sins in particular can lead us into greater sin and eventually cause a person to lose their faith and fall away from Christ. Not by coincidence, we see these sins in the lives of numerous people in Passion story of our Lord.



## The Beginning

Matthew 18:20: *“For where 2 or 3 are gathered in my name, there am I with them”*



175 Years Ago, German families came to America to find a better life. The fourth colony in the area, Frankenhilf, was built on the principle of helping others, offering poor families the opportunity to grow and begin a new life. In 1851 the first worship service was held in a small family home, marking the founding of St. Michael's Lutheran Church.

2 years after the founding, in 1853, the congregation had decided it was time to build a church. Each member dedicated 17 days of work to the project. For several years the church was flourishing.

It soon became clear that the small log church would no longer accommodate the growing congregation, and plans for a new building were made. In 1874 the congregation voted to construct a new church. Construction was followed eagerly by the members, and in 1875 the White Frame Church was dedicated. It faithfully served the congregation until 1971.

In Frankenhilf there were no grand homes or brightly lit, warm living rooms. There were only poorly-constructed log cabins. Life was an endless day-after-day struggle with many different hardships. Despite their poverty the colonists were a happy and contented group. History records that they were always ready to share with their neighbor even though it called for great sacrifice on their part.

Built on faith, Frankenhilf became a community shaped by farming, lumber, and steady work, reflecting the hard work of a growing community.

And although this colony was founded to help the poor, it is incredibly rich in God's love, blessings, and grace. What began as a simple worship service in a family home has grown into a vibrant community, overflowing with faith in Jesus Christ. Our congregation has been built upon a foundation of unwavering faith in God.

Over the next several months, we will be reflecting on the key components that make up our ministry at St. Michael's and the values that have guided us from the very beginning.



**District:** Rep. Matthew Bierlein is in his second term in the Michigan House and was elected to serve the 97th District in November 2022. The 97th District spans portions of Bay, Genesee, Saginaw and Tuscola counties.

**Working for you:** As a Tuscola County native, Matthew has continued to serve the area and worked tirelessly so families and communities in the region can thrive. As a state representative, he has introduced plans that cut burdensome red tape and heavy-handed approaches from state government that have impacted small businesses, workers and families, while advocating for responsible plans that lower taxes and reduce other cost of living burdens. Matthew has also been a consistent leader on improving accountability and transparency within state government to improve Michigan's poor standing in this area. He introduced a plan during the 2023-24 legislative term to provide individual taxpayers who filed a return in the previous taxable year with an annual single page revenue report via mail explaining how tax dollars were allocated, and has supported other proposals that make state government more efficient for the people it is serving.

**Education:** Matthew is a graduate of Vassar High School and Delta College. In 2013, he earned a bachelor's degree in organizational management from Spring Arbor University.

**Professional:** Prior to being elected to the Michigan House of Representatives, Matthew had a career in the manufacturing industry, working as a machine operator, purchasing manager, engineering technician, and production manager. From 2019 to 2022, Matthew served as the in-



district director for Sen. Kevin Daley, working closely with local families, businesses, and service groups. During the COVID-19 pandemic, he helped meet the needs of people in the community who were struggling due to the economic shut down. Matthew served as a Tuscola County commissioner from 2013 to 2019, acting as vice-chair of the board and co-chair of the finance committee. During this time, he also served as president of the Michigan Association of Counties and on the board of directors for the National Association of County Officers.

**Personal:** Matthew and his wife Dr. Mindy Bierlein, a physical therapist, have been married since 2010. They live in Vassar with their three children, Matthew James, Madison and Maddox. Together, they own and operate a physical therapy practice with clinics in Frankenmuth and Bridgeport. The Bierlein family enjoys spending time together outside in the garden or the woods around their homestead. They have a dog named Blaze and enjoy raising livestock.



## Doug Gruber Memorial Sports Scholarship




St. Michael's high school 2026 seniors who participated in high school sports at their local high school are now eligible for a \$1500 scholarship in memory of Doug Gruber.

On Monday, February 9, at the Frankenmuth Scout Building, Nathaniel Courville led 51 volunteers in completing his Eagle Scout service project. Project beneficiary Jameson Strong was in attendance as volunteers created 34 no-sew blankets to provide comfort to children currently receiving cancer treatment at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital.

Sara Boyd, leader of Frankenmuth Girl Scout Troop 50468 and St. Michael's member, praised the collaboration, saying, "We need to do projects like this more often—working together with both Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts."

This month we celebrated our 100th Day of school and being 100 days smarter. To celebrate this, we had several fun math activities to get.

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**1st Grade - Mrs. Janson and Mrs. VanDeVeer**

February is filled with some exciting events and activities including our 100th Day of school, Valentine's Day and President's Day. We celebrate each of these days with various fun activities! We are continuing to work hard on becoming better readers and preparing for second grade.

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**2nd Grade - Mrs. Doan**

Though February is a short month, it is jam packed with special days and activities. On Feb. 2nd we learned about the Groundhog, the homes they live in, shadows, and the legend of the Groundhog's weather predictions. It is also Black History Month so we learned about some famous black leaders who helped with the civil rights movement and freedoms and laws that we now have today. Some of these leaders were Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Rosa Parks, and Ruby Bridges. We also celebrated the 100th day of school on Feb. 11th and on Feb. 12th studied about our 16th President Abe Lincoln whose birthday is that day, followed by George Washington's birthday, so we learned about him as well. And, of course, we celebrated Valentine's Day with a party and card exchange.

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**3rd Grade - Mrs. Bierlein**

In science we are learning about simple machines and how they help to make work easier. In Michigan History, we have just finished learning about the importance of the auto industry in Michigan and how it all began. In math, we have been focusing on multiplying and dividing 6's through 9's.

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**4th Grade - Mrs. Knea**

Fourth grade continues their study on Energy in science class. All their experiments we get to do has helped them have a better understanding of the types of energy. Math has been challenging with the introduction of "long multiplication." They are finding out how helpful it is to know their facts. March is coming quickly. We're looking forward to leading chapel on the 25th of March.

Fifth grade has just finished up the study of the U.S. Constitution. They are sad to report that none of them can currently run for president, but Mrs. Krause could if she wanted to enter politics. Our next novel is *Number the Stars* which is always a class favorite learning about the Holocaust and Resistance movement in WW2 Denmark. Pre-Algebra is finishing up working with percents. 6th Grade is working hard on operations with mixed numbers and fractions. In 6th Literature we are reading "Restart" by Gordon Korman. Most of the kids are enjoying this! We are excited to report that we received a Frankenmuth Credit Union mini-grant and were

able to purchase a new 3D Printer. It just arrived and we are excited to get creative!! Thank You FCU for this excellent opportunity.

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**8th Grade - Mrs. Heinlein-**

Our middle school ELA students have been hard at work! We have built in designated time for reading. DEAR time improves comprehension and will hopefully foster a love of books. It's been great seeing students make such progress in just a few short minutes each day. Students have been reviewing essential grammar skills, including sentence structure, parts of speech, and proper punctuation. All students have the opportunity to use what they are learning as they write each day! Our current writing focus is informational/explanatory writing. Students are learning how to clearly introduce topics, organize ideas logically, use evidence and examples to support their points, and write strong conclusions. 8<sup>th</sup> graders had the opportunity to participate in a Reality Fair put on by Frankenmuth Credit Union and hosted at Reese High School. This fair allowed students to take on a prospective occupation and receive a salary, budget, and plan for their future. It was like the game of Life in real time!!

## Life Sunday


