WHEN THE MORAL COMPASS IS BROKEN



I've never been one to plaster bumper stickers all over my car. People who do seem to have some very strong views, apparently believing that "everyone is entitled to my opinion." Several weeks ago while visiting our son in the

Chicago area I was behind a car with several political stickers. One said, "Normal people don't vote for rapists," an obvious dig at President Trump. (Our President was convicted of sexual abuse in a civil (not criminal) trial for an incident which allegedly occurred in 1996. Trump maintains his innocence.) Right below that sticker was another one that said, "Free Luigi," a reference to Luigi Mangione, the young man charged with murdering health care CEO Brian Thompson. Last year Thompson was shot in the back while walking down the street in New York. Luigi's supporters have praised him for shooting Thompson, just as they cheered the assassination of Charlie Kirk and applauded two assassination attempts on President Trump.

Apparently the driver of the car thought that sexual assault is wrong but that murder is right, depending on who is doing it. In this twisted way of thinking it's okay to shoot people if they disagree with your political beliefs.

News reports several weeks ago revealed that Jay Jones, Democratic candidate for attorney general in Virginia, sent text messages saying the Republican Speaker of the House should get "two bullets to the head." He called the Speaker's children "little fascists" and wished they were dead too. He also said he wanted to do something on the graves of his political opponents in words I will not repeat. This man is running for attorney general, the highest law enforcement office in the state of Virginia, and this is what he wants to do to people who don't agree with him?

We shouldn't be surprised. Ever since 2014 in Ferguson, Missouri, we have seen an escalation of political violence, rioting, and even murder. Not only that, but those on the left have cheered it and applauded it. It's pretty much the same crowd that calls for defunding the police and encourages attacks on ICE agents. This is what happens when people do not have a moral compass to guide them. In a very real sense their political ideology has taken the place of religion. It is their belief system, and they are so committed to it that they have no tolerance for anyone who disagrees. It is no coincidence that many of these same people reject the Christian faith, seeing it as fictional, archaic, and irrelevant. Five years ago

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on a Saturday night I was watching news coverage of the George Floyd riots. Seeing people loot stores, set fires, and throw rocks and bottles at police, I asked my wife, "How many of those people do you think will be in church tomorrow?" That really sums it up, doesn't it? After Charlie Kirk was assassinated there were no riots. Instead his supporters gathered for prayer and worship. They held vigils and found comfort in the promises of God's grace in Christ Jesus.

The Christian faith gives us a framework of right and wrong, good and evil, truth and falsehood. The teachings of Holy Scripture act as a guardrail, telling us how we should live, what to do and what not to do. We have the Ten Commandments to guide us. The Bible says, "Love your neighbor as yourself." "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you." When a society or a nation rejects those teachings and the Biblical standard of right and wrong, what is left? It is as it says in the book of Judges, "Everyone did what was right in his own eyes." Their moral compass is broken. The British author and writer G.K. Chesterton is credited with saying, "When people stop believing in God they don't believe in nothing. They believe in anything." Having rejected the true Gospel, they believe in false gospels that lead to a very dark place.

Our true and only comfort in times like these are the gracious promises of our Savior and the peace that comes from knowing that ultimately, all things are in His hands. By Jesus' incarnation, holy life, and sacrificial death we are redeemed from this sinful world. In the meantime we find solace in prayer, the Word of God, and the fellowship of believers. We shake our heads at what is happening around us. Yet Jesus assures us, "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." Even so, come Lord Jesus.

CLASSROOM CONNECTIONS

(A snapshot of the school!)

Kindergarten –Mrs. Hoeppner and Mrs. Jammer The Kindergarten class enjoyed a field trip to Leaman's Green Apple Barn where the students enjoyed learning how apples grow and how cider is made. They picked apples off of trees, tasted cider & doughnuts, met some friendly farm animals, played on a playground made of retired farm equipment, and had a hayride. Last week we took a trip to Richville Fire Station to learn about fire safety.

1st Grade - Mrs. Janson and Mrs. VanDeVeer October began with a trip to the Richville Fire Station where we learned about fire safety and got to tour the fire trucks. In class we have been learning a variety of new things! We took a field trip this past week to Weiss Farms where we made pretzels and learned some history about the ingredients as well as how the shape of a pretzel reminds us of God's love. The kids loved exploring the corn maze and trying to solve the clues in the maze as well as playing games together in the courtyard of the farm and seeing the animals.

2nd Grade - Mrs. Doan

2nd graders went to the fire station at the beginning of October and saw the firemen get into their gear and crawl on the floor to show what they would do if there was a real fire. The students also got to go into the fire trucks. This week each 2nd grader is doing a report/presentation for Social Studies. They could choose one of 3 options: interview a person 54 years or older to see what life was like for them as a child compared to what life is like for kids today, or bring in some kind of food or treat that was from their family's culture or heritage, like a recipe handed down generation to generation, or tell a tradition or two that their family does.

3rd Grade - Mrs. Bierlein

In Science we finished up a chapter talking about ecosystems and the animals in those ecosystems. To conclude our chapter each student created and presented a diorama showing an animal in their habitat. We are now learning about different types of fossils. In Michigan History we are talking about the

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native people who lived in Michigan and how the French fur traders began to change how they lived.

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4th Grade - Mrs. Knea

This month we took our first Math, Science, and Social Studies tests and finished our first units in Reading and Religion. We're working on our first big project of the year, exploring and labeling landmarks and cities in the five regions of the US. Our first field trip is Oct 31st and we can't wait!

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5th Grade - Mrs. Krause

The 5th graders are hard at work. They enjoyed working on their first social studies projects with cake and candy ships along with Lego ships, maps, and a diorama. These will be in the hall outside our classroom through parent teacher conferences. We also finished our first novel The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe, finishing up watching the movie in class. We are looking forward to being a "big" kid and enjoying a movie in the gym for our fall party.

6th Grade - Mrs. Woodward

The 6th grade Science class created plant and animal cells and have been starting to learn about the 5 Kingdoms. 7th grade Science finished up a unit on minerals and have started learning about the rock cycle and igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks. 8th grade Science has been learning about physical and chemical changes and the differences between the two, including labs exploring the different reactions.

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7th Grade - Mrs. Lamb

The DC Trip was incredible! We did so many fantastic things, saw so many marvelous sites, and the kids behaved superbly. The 6th grade just finished reading the classic survival novel <u>Hatchet</u> by Gary Paulsen and in Social Studies they just finished up a unit on Human Geography. The 7th grade is learning about the very first civilization in Mesopotamia. In English, 7th will be writing an argumentative essay and I am curious to see what topics they choose. Both math classes are chugging along. The kids are doing very well and I've been pleased with their academic progress already. Happy October!

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Resource Room - Mrs. Newton

Now that all the beginning-of-the-year reading screenings on K-4 are complete, the teachers and I have come up with schedules for me to work with the students who need some extra help. I am currently working with 15

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different students, some in small groups and some 1:1. Mrs. Elaine Keinath has been gracious enough to volunteer her expertise and is volunteering on Tuesday and Thursday mornings; she works with an additional 10 students. I love the impact that we can have in supporting academic success for these students!

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Media Center/Upcoming Events - Mrs. Brown In the Media Center we read a lot of fall themed books, most of them stories of being brave, making friends and the joy of autumn. We made some cute pumpkins out of pipe cleaners. Scholastic Book Fair will be Nov. 10-14. Setting up E-Wallets is great for keeping students on budget while they shop!
