UNIT 1.1 – AUTUMN TERM 1 – COPY CAT

UNIT OVERVIEW

In this unit of work, pupils will learn the difference between patterns in rhythm and pitch. They will listen to and copy rhythmic patterns, perform short ostinato patterns and work on keeping a steady beat. They will grow their understanding of how words and phrases can be transformed into chants, whilst maintaining a steady beat. They will perform chants using a range of pitches.

LINKS TO PRIOR LEARNING

In Early Years, pupils will have been exposed to rhymes and songs with strong rhythmic beats. They will be familiar with marching. They will have a growing understanding of syllables from their work on segmenting phonic sounds.
