UNIT 1.2- AUTUMN TERM 2 - I SING, YOU SING

UNIT OVERVIEW

In this short unit of work, pupils will learn a range of question-and-answer songs. They will improvise by making up their own answers in each verse of these songs. They will learn that during a song, performers don't always sing together, and they sometimes take it in turns to sing. Pupils will continue to learn to pitch notes accurately in these simple, repetitive melodies.

LINKS TO PRIOR LEARNING

In Early Years, pupils will have been exposed to rhymes and songs with strong rhythmic beats. They will have a growing understanding of syllables from their work on segmenting phonic sounds. In the previous Y1 unit, pupils learnt the difference between rhythm and pitch and have experienced maintaining a steady beat.

Hand out animal masks/animal cards to several pupils to wear/hold up during the song. Each time round, a child names a new animal and the song continues. Once an animal has been selected, that pupil puts their card down and joins in with the song. You do not need a musical backing for this but keep clapping the beat as the song progresses.
