

Gallup Public Radio's board of directors meets on the second Monday of each month, from approximately 5:30 until 7 p.m., normally in the UNMG Executive Director's Conference Room, Gurley Hall, 1216-E (Until COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, these meetings will take place online.) Per requirements of the Communications Act of 1932, 47 U.S.C. §396, et. seq., as amended (Communications Act or Act), we want all persons to know that they shall be permitted to attend any meeting of the board, or any such committee or body affiliated with KGLP, and that no person shall be required, as a condition of attendance at any such meeting, to register such person's name or to provide any other information (although an email address may be helpful in order for us to share online meeting information.)

The term, "meeting", means the deliberations of at least the number of members of a governing or advisory body, or any committee thereof, required to take action on behalf of such body or committee where such deliberations determine or result in the joint conduct or disposition of the governing or advisory body's business, or the committee's business, as the case may be, but only to the extent that such deliberations relate to public broadcasting.

Prerequisites for a "Meeting": In order for a gathering of board, committee, or Community Advisory Board (CAB) members to constitute a meeting under the Act, the following are necessary:

1. the presence of a quorum; and
2. deliberations that determine or result in the joint conduct or disposition of business related to public broadcasting.

Note that deliberations do not require any formal action or vote. Any discussion of public broadcasting issues that may influence the opinions of members makes it a meeting.

While the Act requires stations to allow anyone to attend any Open Meeting (or any portion of a meeting that is open) without requiring the person to register, or provide his or her name or other information, in the event such information is necessary to ensure a safe meeting environment, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting does not consider the request for such information a violation of the Act.
