- 1. **Introducing the Rat** Start by letting your dog sniff a safely contained rat to build interest.
- 2. **Basic Indications** Reward your dog for showing interest in the rat.
- 3. Navigating the Course Teach your dog to climb on bales and go through tunnels.
- 4. **Building Confidence** Gradually introduce distractions and more complex searches.

Handling Techniques

- For Nervous Dogs: Use encouragement, keep sessions short, and reward engagement.
- For High-Drive Dogs: Work on impulse control, reward precision, and pace their excitement.
