Brighter Future at the Center A Message from the Board

Thanks to a generous Estacada family, the Center's future is brighter. The Kellendonk family (specifically Jack and his Mother Mae,) was an advocate and supporter of the Center; so much so, that Jack bequeathed money and his property to the Center when he passed away.

His will stated, "B. All The rest, residue and remainder of my estate, not otherwise disposed of by this Will, including any lapsed gifts will be distributed to the Friends of Estacada Community Center, Inc., an Oregon nonprofit corporation, or its duly constituted and organized successor, in care of its governing body to be used for any purpose deemed appropriate by the governing body."

For years the Center maintained the property and rented out the house which, over time provided some operating revenue. It took 5 years to recoup the \$30,000 cost of bringing the 100-year-old house up to code before it could be rented. Additional expenses: 1) the cost of mandated inspections and maintenance of the septic system; 2) annual inspection of the house and required repairs; 3) real property taxes and insurance.

Previous Boards researched and discussed potential uses that would benefit Seniors, including the possibility of building a new Community Center. The cost was prohibitive since the Center was struggling financially to cover required projects and maintenance costs. In 2016, the Center was really struggling financially, and the Board decided to put the property up for sale. Thankfully, the property did not sell. Slowly Center donations and support began to grow, and the property was taken off the market. Over the years, the Board was approached by interested developers and community members wishing to purchase the property. The Board consulted with local landowners and investors and felt the offers were not viable.

It was not until Alan Rademacher, longtime friend and neighbor of Jack Kellendonk, came to the Board with a proposal to purchase the property that the Board considered selling. Alan knew Jack wanted to support the Center and offered \$1,450,000 to purchase the property. Alan planned to move his business (Estacada Bark) to the lower portion of the property facing Highway 224. He also wanted to develop the upper portion of the property along Eagle Creek Road as part of his retirement plan. The Board voted to sell the property and use the proceeds for the future sustainability of the Center. Unfortunately, Alan passed away shortly before the final sale of the property. The executor of the estate has completed the sale.

The Center is extremely grateful to the Kellendonk family. The funds obtained are providing the Center with an income stream which will allow the Center to continue providing seniors in the community with needed services.

Clients Success Story

A Saga of a Healing Journey

A November 2020 trip to the ER revealed heart and lung related issues and as a result turned my life upside down. At the end of the second hospitalization a home care team nurse didn't hesitate in calling the Estacada Community Center to request Meals on Wheels. He was very concerned as my weight dropped below 100 pounds. That was the beginning of my long healing journey to better health. One which I say repeatedly, "I couldn't have come this far with out the Estacada Community Center."

During the first year, I had frequent medical appointments requiring travel to Oregon City and Gresham. Depression set in along with excessive fatigue and shortness of breath. Walking from my car into a facility required several stops to rest and gasp for breath. Little improvement, growing isolation, in bed almost 24/7.

I AM living example of Estacada Community Center's mission. The benefits of the Center which serve Estacada and it's outlying areas are numerous, nurturing and generous. They are absolutely given with a caring, nonjudgmental philosophy. The first component is the strong and competent staff and volunteers. These folks exude positivity and strive to be accessible. They have a clear knowledge of available resources within the community and with goals to assist folks when appropriate. The environment is beyond cheerful and inviting. One begins to be lifted up simply by walking through the front door. A smiling greeter is often nearby and ready to sign in folks to lunch that is delicately prepared and served.

I became a member and it opened numerous opportunities and further helped me along my healing journey. As a member I get a monthly newsletter that describes upcoming activities at the Center and even a list of that month's birthdays.

From my position, knocking on deaths door, not caring, and taking very little responsibility toward better heath to a current most often positive attitude and I owe this in part to my connection with the Center and the benefits of their services. I reflected on this saying, "step by step" and I added to that, "it's going to be up to me." And ending with, "may the circle be unbroken."

The center benefits that I take advantage of are; participating in fitness classes, these classes are donation based which allow seniors on fixed incomes to attend. I found I'm not alone in this journey as socialization is a big part of being connected with the Center. The Center also assists seniors and other community members with Energy Assistance applications. I have had the opportunity to take advantage of social events and one of my favorite outings was the Wooden Shoe Tulip Festival. The Center also takes care of our furry friends by offering pet food assistance.

Currently I can walk to a medial appointment from my car without having to stop for rest to catch my breath. A pacemaker was implanted two years ago. One year ago, one heart medication was removed with the result being increased joy, better mood and physical energy increased and depression somewhat reduced. My self-esteem and my self-respect grew and I GRADUATED MEALS ON WHEELS!!

All is not solved. I grieve for loss of strength, energy and stamina. Acceptance of the aging process is better, but not great. I am working on it. Now with my connection to the Center, I have a stable resource. I have moved back into a better reality with increased joy and appreciation of living life.

Thank you to the Estacada Community Center, I couldn't have come this far without you. Blessings to all.

How We Help? - Feeding the Community

NUTRITIONAL SERVICES

- Home Delivered Meals Our volunteers and staff delivered 26490 meals to 164 total homebound clients. They drove over 18 thousand miles, volunteers donate time and drive their own vehicles. The total number of home bound clients has stayed steady comparable to the prior year. During the 24-25 fiscal year the Center experienced a reduction in federal funding of approximately 20% and expect to experience further reductions in this program for the 25-26 fiscal year. Despite reductions in funding the Center has not implemented a wait list for services. The Center does not require qualified home bound clients to pay for meals, however, donations are greatly appreciated.
- ▶ Home Delivered Food Boxes The Center has partnered with the Estacada Food Bank, Dave's Killer Bread, and other local farmers and community members to provide extra food to home bound clients. Our delivery drivers have delivered over 700 food boxes to help supplement the nutrition needs of seniors in our community.
- Lunches at the Center- The Center serves lunch on Monday, Tuesday Wednesday and Friday. The Center offers breakfast on Thursdays. In total Center has provided a total 2481 in person meals during the fiscal year.

TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

- ▶ Rides- The Center has provided 1771 rides to the Center, local points of interest, shopping, and appointments in Estacada.
- Monthly Field Trips and Shopping Trips

RECREATIONAL AND SOCIAL SERVICES

- ► The Center provides 350 fitness classes annually. All classes provided are donation based, so no participant is turned away. Donations are greatly appreciated.
 - Exercise Classes-led by a Volunteer Instructor. Refit Monday night, Pound-Tuesday night, Rev & Flow
 Wednesday Night, Adult Exercise Monday & Thursday Mornings. These classes have up to 20
 participants.
 - ► Tai Chi for better balance Evidence based -led by a certified instructor- offered Wednesdays and Friday and typically have up to 15 participants.

ANIMEALS

▶ The Center partners with FIDO of Oregon City and gets other donations to deliver/provide pet food to an average of 30 clients once a month.

► REASSURANCE AND RESOURCE ASSISTANCE

▶ The Center assisted 1,410 clients with resources, information and care calls & visits.

2024-2025 Top Fiscal Year Priorities

<u>Nutrition & Socialization Programs</u>—The Center has identified increased need to help isolated seniors. The Centers home delivered meal program more than doubled during COVID while the inperson lunches & programs have stayed flat. As a result, our priority is to assist and promote our in-person services to isolated, lonely and/or depressed seniors. Added 65 new MOW clients.

<u>Building-</u> The Center will be the recipient of a CDBG Grant to replace old worn rotted siding. We expect the project to Start in the Fall of 2024. Project delayed due to other county priorities.

<u>Transportation</u>— Work with Clackamas County to attract volunteers for County transportation programs helping seniors obtain rides to appointments, pharmacies etc.

2024-2025 Fiscal Year in Review

Continue to promote wellness, nutrition, exercise, socialization and transportation programs. The Center continued to see increased utilization of program offerings. Exercise classes, and field trips continue to experience increased participation.

The Center focused on homebound visits and care calls to isolated seniors. As a result, resources and support provided increased over the prior fiscal year.

2025-2026 Top Fiscal Year Priorities

<u>Building</u> - The CDBG Grant was delayed to replace siding on the building, now scheduled for completion fall of 2025.

<u>Programs</u> - Board approved to have a part-time outreach coordinator position to help with increasing participations in programs, fundraisers and community outreach.

<u>Transportation</u> - Board approved to add a back-up driver for the shuttle to assist with driving responsibilities as needs increase.

<u>Nutrition Program</u> - seek additional funding to mitigate the funding shortfall from Older Americans Act
