March Horticultural Moment

Do you care about the **COLOR** of food you grow..and eat?

Well, you should. Each plant comes with its own set of nutrients. And of those nutrients, each one performs some pretty amazing functions for your body.

My latest curiosity has been about purple foods. Purple foods contain anthocyanins. And these anthocyanins have numerous health benefits to include enhancing your immune system, reducing inflammation, lowering heart disease risk, controlling blood sugar levels, improved digestion and brain health! Which is exactly why I feel smarter after researching and starting to eat something purple every day! See, it works;-)

But in all seriousness, we know that a variety of foods are good for us. And sometimes, it's even better when we know why. If you want to know more about the specifics, you can dig into the linked article. But if you want to just dig in..think about finding ways to incorporate purple foods into your daily menu. Some to consider are blueberries, honey berries, blackberries, purple cabbage, grapes, eggplant, purple potatoes, beets...thick purple skin or purple flesh. FGC March 19, 2025 Pioneer Hall in Pioneer Park

Program: "Compost Tea" with Lisa W.

Compost tea is a liquid natural fertilizer to make plants thrive. The two kinds are aerated, which Lisa tried, and non-aerated which requires stirring daily.

Her recipe is 3 cups of high quality compost in 5 gallons of non-chlorinated water,

add 1 - 2 tablespoons of unsulphured molasses. Let set for 24 hours at 75 – 90 degrees F. Strain, dilute 1 part to 5 parts water, and use by spraying on plant foliage or near the roots. Compost tea must be used within 6 hours and not on food near harvest time. Lisa said she had temperature issues at first, but her 3rd try was successful.

Susie C. sent this recipe

This recipe was given to me in 1971 by Mrs. Legg, an Italian woman in her 80's, who owned a farm in Maple Valley, Washington. Enjoy!

Rhubarb Coffee Cake

1 1/2 cups light brown sugar

1/2 c. butter

1 c. buttermilk (you can use 1 c. milk with 2 Tbsp. vinegar)

2 cups flour

1 . baking soda

2 cups fresh or frozen rhubarb cut into 1/2 inch lengths

1/4 cup cinnamon sugar combo

Cream the butter and sugar. Alternatively add the buttermilk and flour with baking soda.

Stir in rhubarb. Spread the batter into a 9X13" buttered pan. Sprinkle on cinnamon sugar. Bake for 40 minutes at 350 degrees.














Plant America Feed America Fairbanks Garden Club

Feed America. At the January meeting, Althea handed forms to everyone who contributed food to the community last summer and reminded us to estimate, complete, and return forms to her. All members can track their donations of produce to non-profits, friends, neighbors and others. The form (see screenshot above) covers donations made between May 4, 2023 to May 4, 2025. The program encourages garden club members to help fight hunger in America. Over 5M kids go hungry daily.

I did have a red worm colony going last year and dumped a bunch of the red worms in my compost pile. I always find some worms when using the broad fork in the garden.

Millie P. My pond is breeding ground for dragonflies.

Amanda R.: Hope to plant lots of flowers for the bees and other insects. I will have a watering place for bees, etc.







