- The principle of government by consent established by the Mayflower Compact, as well advancement of the Christian faith.
- Plymouth colony established; growth in and establishment of the 13 colonies.
- •French and Indian war preceded the British tyranny and patriot revolt.

Review

- •The Intolerable Acts brought taxation, regulation, and violation of their rights on the Colonists, culminating with the <u>Boston Tea Party</u>.
- The King of England went as far as to dissolve their representative bodies, so the people held conventions to choose delegates for a <u>Continental Congress</u>.
- July 2, 1776 The <u>Declaration of Independence</u> was written during the second Continental Congress, cutting all ties with the Great Britain and England.
