Overview.

Economic Pressures and Impact

Rising employer National Insurance rates are forcing fundraising teams to focus intensively on cost efficiency and net financial contribution. The ongoing economic squeese has created a challenging environment where charities must carefully balance service delivery with financial sustainability.

Funding Landscape

Major funding disruptions are occurring across multiple fronts:

International aid faces significant cuts, with the UK government announcing approximately 40% reduction in aid budget

Public sector grants and contracts are experiencing widespread cuts similar to 2023 patterns

The Chancellor's growth budget appears to be underperforming, suggesting potential further departmental budget reductions

Adaptation Strategies

Charities are responding through:

Increased focus on optimising mailing lists and donor targeting using Al tools

Prioritising retention of existing donors over acquisition of new ones Diversifying income portfolios, especially for organisations previously reliant on government funding



Digital Transformation

Financial pressures are accelerating digital adoption:

Advanced analytics and Al tools being leveraged for campaign refinement

Growing investment in data-driven decision making Increased use of digital platforms for fundraising and donor engagement

Global Economic Risks

Several external factors threaten sector stability:

US trade tensions with major partners affecting global economic trade Concerns over US economic health potentially impacting global markets Continued cost-of-living pressures affecting both charitable giving and demand for services

Recovery Outlook

The sector showed signs of recovery in 2024, but remains vulnerable to government policy changes and economic shifts. Organisations focusing on efficiency, digital transformation, and diverse funding streams are better positioned to weather ongoing economic challenges.


Monday, 26th May, 2025. We will be taking part in the Whit Walks in Manchester City Centre, this will be in the morning finishing around lunchtime.
