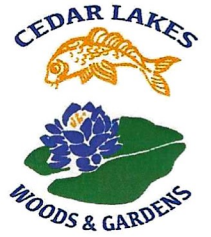

Red Maple

Found through most of the state, grows in wet areas but can be grown in the landscape if given adequate irrigation.

Long Leaf Pine

Longleaf pine takes 100 to 150 years to become full size and may live to be 500 years old.

Bald Cypress

The main trunk is often surrounded by cypress knees. The oldest cypress in Florida is estimated to be 2,704 years old as of 2020.

Painted Turtle

During the day, painted turtles will bask in the sun, sometimes as many as 50 on one log, stacked on top of each other.

Southern Live Oak

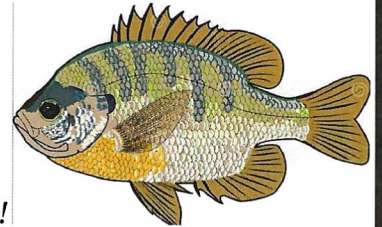
A mature live oak tree can draw up to 50 gallons+ per day through its tap root deep in the ground.

Bream Fish

Native to Florida, lives in schools and eats worms, mollusks, and other small animals.

Red Cardinal

The female builds a cup nest in a well-concealed spot in dense shrub or a low tree.

Bull Frog

The speed of a bullfrog's tongue strike is similar to the tension on a slingshot pulled all the way back.

Grey Squirrel

The eastern gray squirrel is one of very few mammalian species that can descend a tree head-first.

Mosquito Fish

"Gambusia" eat mosquito larvae, and has been used more than any other fishes for the biological control of mosquitoes.

Red Cedar

Extremely tolerant of drought due to its fibrous root system and reduced leaf area.

Muscadine Grape

Provides wildlife habitat as shelter, browse, and food for many birds and animals.
