I had the good fortune to lead the exhibiting seminars at APS' Summer Seminar for three years. I thought it would be useful to describe the contents of the seminars so those interested in the seminars' content would have the information they want. Also, to the extent that this detailed discussion about the content of an exhibiting class might be of utility to others who teach similar classes, this detailed discussion allows us to begin sharing ideas.

No two summer seminars are the same; the knowledge, interests and experience of the participants is never the same from year to year. Whatever outline or syllabus I have only lasts until the first few moments of the first hour of the first day. The major content areas are largely the same but there is a tremendous amount of variation from year to year. Please remember, this outline covered a three full day class.
