**Nancy S. Miller, MD**, is Chief and Vice Chair for Laboratory Medicine and serves as the Medical Director for Clinical Microbiology and Molecular Diagnostics at Boston Medical Center. She is also a Clinical Professor in the Department of Pathology & Laboratory Medicine at Boston University Chobanian & Avedisian School of Medicine. She earned her M.D. with distinction in research from SUNY-Stony Brook. She completed her residency in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology, and fellowship training in medical microbiology all at Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions. She is a pathologist and clinical microbiologist with more than two decades of experience in infectious disease diagnostics, patient care, outbreak response and preparedness. She advises and leads translational research including development of in-vitro infectious diseases diagnostics and comparative evaluation studies, and is immersed in the challenges of diagnostic microbiology and process improvement every day.

**Marisa C. Nielsen** received her B.S in Microbiology and her M.S. in Environmental Microbiology from University of Arizona. She spent nearly a decade working in clinical microbiology before deciding to pursue her PhD at University of California, Irvine. Afterwards, she completed her Clinical Microbiology Fellowship at University of Texas, Medical Branch. She is a certified Specialist in Microbiology by the American Society for Clinical Pathology and a board-accredited Diplomate of the American Board of Medical Microbiology. Her interests range from microbiome research to infectious diseases diagnostics and microscopy, with a specific focus on pathogens acquired from environmental exposures. Currently, she is an Assistant Professor for Pathology and Laboratory Medicine at Boston University Chobanian and Avedisian School of Medicine, as well as the Assistant Director for Clinical Microbiology at Boston Medical Center.

### Diagnostic Medical Parasitology Review

Lynne S. Garcia, MS, CLS, FAAM (LSG & Associates)

The program will provide updated information on test names, ordering, specimen collection (including the single vial/molecular testing option), processing, testing, and reporting (limitations/interpretation). Challenges related to personnel shortages will also be addressed. Pros and cons for the O&P examination, fecal immunoassays, molecular options (limited/pending more comprehensive systems), and special stains for the coccidia and microsporidia will be reviewed. Organism morphology, pathogenicity, prevalence, and clinical relevance will also be included for the protozoa, helminths, and blood parasites. A practical approach to testing will be emphasized, including the importance of test result report comments. Level: Intermediate

- Discuss changes in processing, testing, and reporting
- Review STATS vs routine testing
- Discuss endemic changes (populations, neglected tropical diseases, geography)
- Review organism updates (diagnosis, pathogenicity protozoa, helminths, blood parasites))
- Discuss routine vs molecular methods (including potential panels and organisms detected)
- Discuss laboratory reporting and the importance of report comments

## Antibiotics for Students and Others – You Pick the Ending!

Dr. Stephen Brecher, BS, MS, PhD (BU School of Medicine, VA Healthcare Boston)



This workshop will take you on a journey from the discovery of antibiotics, through the golden years of new antibiotics, to the emergence of antibiotic resistance (super bugs), to the paucity of new antibiotics, and the possibility of a world without antibiotics. We will discuss the why and how of the multitude of changes in antibiotic testing over the past 45 years and simplify testing and understanding test results. We will use multiple methods of engagement, including case reports, group discussions and anecdotal stories. The workshop will end with a discussion of the newest technologies in antibiotic susceptibility testing, and we can discuss how they may help improve patient care. This can lead to a discussion of cost, time to results, communication of results, and patient outcomes. **Level: Basic-Intermediate** 

- Learn about life before antibiotics and the impact of penicillin, especially during WWII, had on the survival of humans and animals.
- Discuss what went wrong the year I graduated from college in Microbiology in 1967, the Surgeon General said we can close the book on Infectious Diseases.
- Understand the reasons for changes in antibiotic susceptibility testing breakpoints, especially with respect to the emergence of antibiotic resistance.
- Discuss and explore future options in antibiotic susceptibility testing and issues that will arise such as genotypic vs phenotypic results that may differ.

**BLOCK 1:** AI-Assisted Automated Digital Microscopy in Microbiology

In the last few decades, automated digital microscopy has emerged as a prominent technology to assist in detection and diagnosis of diseases in many fields. Although the adoption of digital microscopy has been relatively slow in microbiology, it brings many advantages. Digital microscopy can provide a more efficient workflow, reduce the need for storing slides, provide ease of access to relevant information, and improve the working conditions of microbiologists. With the proliferation of artificial intelligence in the recent years, digital microscopy gained more popularity. The addition of Al assisted analysis provides high detection accuracy of microorganisms, reduced human error, time savings and high throughput. This presentation will discuss the advantages of Al-assisted automated digital microscopy in microbiology, as well as its limitations and current challenges. Level: Intermediate

- Understand the advantages and limitations of AI assisted analysis in digital microscopy
- Discuss the future outlook for slide digitization and artificial intelligence in microbiology

The laboratory tools available to clinicians and scientists have evolved at breakneck pace over the years. In this session, we will discuss how the evolution of laboratory methodology has and will affect laboratory workflow, antimicrobial stewardship, and ultimately patient care. Specifically, we will highlight the progression from manual testing strategies, to the introduction of rapid molecular methods to MALDI-TOF, and what this changing landscape means for the future of the clinical microbiology field.. **Level: Intermediate** 

- Understand the unique and important roles of manual and rapid molecular testing in the laboratory
- Gain a technical understanding of MALDI-TOF and where the technology fits in the laboratory
- Understand how different members of the care team (laboratorians, pharmacists) can benefit from evolving technology

**The Evolution of Molecular Diagnostics for Infectious Diseases** Dr. Esther Babady, PhD, D(ABMM) (Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center)



Molecular diagnostic tests have evolved significantly in the last thirty years. From being performed exclusively in specialized, high-complexity laboratories to now also being available as CLIA-waived, point-ofcare and at-home tests that can be performed on anyone's kitchen counter. This wide-range of molecular tests, with varying degrees of complexity, opens up unprecedented opportunities for clinical laboratories to build a significant tests menu for the molecular diagnosis of infectious diseases. This workshop will review the history and evolution of molecular diagnostics tests and discuss how they revolutionized the diagnosis of many infectious diseases. Additionally, novel and advanced diagnostic tests, including host-response markers and next-generation sequencing methods, will be discussed to round up the continued evolution of molecular diagnostic tests in infectious diseases. Level: Intermediate

- Discuss examples of early commercial molecular tests and their impact on infectious diseases
- Describe the evolution and current state of molecular tests for infectious diseases

Having our discussion based on cases, we'll first discuss different types of AFB staining scenarios. Secondly, we will cover different testing methodologies for identification of Mycobacteria, which will make up the bulk of this workshop. Then, lastly, we will touch on susceptibility testing. **Level: Basic-Intermediate**

## **Fungal Infections: Still Ignored**

James T. Griffith, PhD, CLS(NCA) (Forensic DNA Associates, UMass Dartmouth)

Fungal infections, long ignored, have risen to the attention of the World Health Organization so much so that action is recommended. These circumstances exist in the U.S. as well and represent an opportunity for American clinical microbiology laboratories to re-assert the importance of specimen collection, initial characterization and actual identification of isolates as we once did. This session will look at the obstacles as well as the possible solutions to the problem facing us in the service of our patients, as well as the most pressing fungal agents and the infections they cause. **Level: Intermediate**

## Garbage In, Garbage Out: Why Collection Devices Matter and Why You Should Use them!

This session will focus on 3 areas in the clinical microbiology laboratory. First, we will discuss specimen collection devices for infectious disease diagnosis; specifically, liquid-based microbiology (LBM) collection devices and how they compare to older, traditional non-LBM devices. Collection devices for several specimen types will be discussed. Second, we will focus on how LBM collection devices allow for a more streamlined and efficient automated workflow for microbiology culture analytics. Lastly, we will explore the use of artificial intelligence (AI) software applications to assist in the interpretation of culture results. **Level: Basic-Intermediate** 

- Understand liquid-based microbiology (LBM) collection devices and how they can be used in the clinical microbiology laboratory.
- Discuss how LBM products can lead to the implementation of automation in microbiology.
- Explore how AI is used with culture interpretations to assist microbiologists in more rapidly and efficiently reporting and working up of cultures in the laboratory.


