While PTSD rates are higher for women than men in areas not in conflict, exposure to events and images in countries that are, whether first hand or witnessed on screens everywhere, gives PTSD a global reach. Montage Initiative explores what PTSD is, what it does to us and ways in which we can alleviate its affect.

Coinciding with the UN's 69th Commission on the Status of Women and 25th Anniversary of the Beijing +30 Declaration, Montage Initiative highlights 3 of the 12 Areas of Concern for women flagged in the 1995 Beijing Platform for Action; Violence Against Women, Women in Armed Conflict and the Human Rights of Women.

Ingrid Stellmacher, Founder & CEO, Le Menach Foundation

What is the long-term impact of violence and discrimination against women and girls, on not only the victims but the perpetrators? Do repeated acts of violence on others affect the brain development of those committing it, rewiring the way they see the world, and what is its global impact? Ten years after launching the 'Dignity Diaries' at the United Nations in New York, Ingrid revisits those questions and the collective condition it creates that she calls 'Poverty of the Heart'.

Kim Aris, Aid to Burma

Son of former Burmese/Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kyi, Kim works tirelessly on initiatives and awareness of the desperate situation in Burma, where 30 million people are living in poverty, 20 million are in urgent need of humanitarian assistance, and millions are forecast by the UN to face starvation conditions by 2025. Inevitably the level of PTSD and trauma affecting women and girls is huge through the level of armed conflict, violence, and impact on the overall attack on their Human Rights as women. Kim shares personal insights about the loss of freedom and dignity women experience in Burma and how he works to bring it back.

H.E. the Hon. Robert Rae, Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the UN for Canada

His Excellency the Hon. Robert Rae is Canada's Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the UN in NY and elected the 80th President of the 2025 session of ECOSOC. Ambassador Rae gives his perspective and updates on the current prevalence of PTSD in Canada.
