

Challenge during Inspection of a Food Service Facility And Resulting Court case

September 15, 2009

To Whom It May Concern:

On September 14, 2009, — visited the — Restaurant.. The — County Health Department received a plan review packet for change of ownership of this facility on July 27, 2009. The visit was to see who the current owners of the facility were, because they may have changed owners without notifying us first for an opening inspection. When we arrived, I asked a waiter if I could speak to the owner. —came out to speak to us, so the change of ownership had not occurred yet. Mr. —stated that it would happen on September 24th or 25th. While waiting for the owner to come out and speak to us, — noticed numerous critical violations at the —. Because of these violations, we decided to do a full inspection while we were there. While doing my inspection, I was talking to Mr. — about the change of ownership and moving out of —. During our conversation, he patted me on the shoulder and back at least 3 or 4 times. — was in the back of the restaurant looking around at this time. I went and found — and told him that if Mr. — touches me again that I was going to say something to him, so — stayed with me for the rest of the inspection. We found that the walk in cooler was not holding 41 degrees or lower. We started taking internal temperatures of the potentially hazardous foods in the cooler. The last items we checked were two cases of eggs. Mr. — employee, Ms. —, told me that the eggs were delivered the morning of our inspection, so I asked to see the invoice. There was not a time listed on the invoice, so Mir. —employee, Ms. —, told me they were delivered at ten thirty that morning. The food code allows food to be out of temperature for four hours, and after four hours it has to be thrown away. As I explained this to Mr. —, he forcefully grabbed me by my arm and pushed me up against the wall. When he did that I said "If you touch me again" but did not get to finished me sentence because he slammed the walk in cooler door in my face, and I was pinned between the wall and the door. He went in the cooler, grabbed the case of eggs and threw them on the floor and started kicking the eggs around. He then started yelling at me and threatening me saying "I'll see you out, and I'll get you." — said to him that he did not need to be threatening me, and I said that if he continued to act like that, we would call the police. Mr. — went out to the dining room and calmed down. We all sat down to go over the inspection violations, and he started threatening me again. — said to Mr. — again that he did not need to be threatening me, and he stopped. We went over the violations and told him we would be back in 24 hours to do a reinspection.

May 17, 2010

—Restaurant —

On September 14, 2009, at approximately 1:00 pm in the afternoon a restaurant inspection was conducted at — restaurant at —. After the inspection process an accusation of battery and interfering with the health officers duties was lodged against —restaurant by the inspector —. Documented statements by the —employees were submitted to Officer — of the —on September 16, 2009. Charges were brought against Mr. — and a jury trial convened in Magistrate Court in —West Virginia on April 27, 2010. The presiding Magistrate was —and the court Docket number was __; — vs State of West Virginia. The trial hearing lasted approximately 9 hours with jury selection, opening statements, prosecution testimony from the — County Health Department sanitarians then the defendant's version of the facts. At the conclusion of the testimony, Magistrate judge —agreed with the defense that interfering with the health officers duties was not a valid claim since the inspection was completed. If the inspection was not completed then interfering or impeding with the health officer would result. As for the count of battery the jury was read instructions and then sent to deliberate a guilty or not guilty decision. The jury at one point asked a question of the court the meaning of battery. The definition of battery was submitted and in a matter of minutes the jury was ready to reconvene. The court assembled and the lead juror announced a guilty verdict for the charge of battery against —. A process of negotiations emerged between the prosecution and defense with involvement of Magistrate — to determine acceptable sentencing for Mr. —. Some suggestions were community service, anger management classes, fines, incarceration, and a probation period. After a lengthy discussion, based the special circumstances of Mr. —, the state prosecution and victim decided on all court costs and a conviction of battery would be sufficient based on Mr. —wanting to appeal the guilty verdict. Magistrate — also added a fine of \$500. After sentencing, the defense attorney told —that Mr. — would like to have an audience outside the court room to speak them. Mr. — bowed, shook hands, and apologized to both —.



Answers to previous Quiz

1. **Salmonella**—Environmental sources include water, soils, animal feces, raw meats and poultry. Acute symptoms are Nausea, vomiting, cramps, fever and headache. Onset time is 6 to 48 hours, symptoms lasting 1 to 2 days. Associated foods are raw meats, poultry, eggs, milk , coconut, cake mixes, and peanut butter.
2. **Listeria**—The bacteria will manifest with meningitis, intrauterine infections in pregnant women and may result in stillbirth or miscarriage. This bacteria will grow at refrigeration temperatures.
3. **Vibrio parahaemolyticus**—Diagnosis is from stool cultures. Infections are associated with consumption of raw, improperly cooked or cooked fish and shellfish.
4. **Ciguatera**—causes a human poisoning when the human consumes tropical marine finfish which have accumulated naturally occurring toxins through their diet. Symptoms usually are combined by gastrointestinal, neurological, and cardiovascular disorders.
5. **Giardia**—causes the most frequent non-bacterial diarrhea in North America.
