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## FROM PASTOR MUSE

There are many things that we can learn from the past year. We have all been given opportunities to advance ourselves in areas we never imagined. Remote learning, online church, wearing a mask, constant reminders to washing our hands, and social distancing are just a few of the many things we had to learn in 2020. We carry these lessons into 2021 as we plot a course for the next year. The biggest lesson that we have had to learn and the one that will create the foundation for our movement forward is flexibility. We have had to learn to be flexible in the midst of all that we face, and the more we embrace flexibility, the stronger we will be in the coming year.

Every day is different in these times, more so than ever before. We are daily looking at the numbers, body count, infection rate, spread, calendar proximity to large events, along with a myriad of other factors that will direct our decisions. These factors change daily, so what worked yesterday may not work today, but it may work again tomorrow. We are engaged in a dance that causes us to continually move in different directions.

The church is no different at this time.

As individual believers and as a community, we continue to be called into flexibility as we face this current situation. We saw this flexibility already play out in our collective interest. After the initial shut-down, we came back together for a brief period. Then we saw the rise in positive cases, the county going into the purple, and an increased concern after Thanksgiving and leading to Christmas. This brought us to the place of staying apart and doing our work remotely. This was a wise and necessary decision at the time.

Now we are planning on coming back together again. The case numbers seemed to have stabilized, though not good by any stretch. Large gatherings are in our review mirror, so beginning on Sunday, January 10, we will come back together for in-person worship. The same format and times will be used as last time we came back together, 8:30 am and 11:00 am, with the 11:00 am service being live-streamed. We will attempt to bring forward faithful and meaningful worship in the current situation. We have had to be flexible in how we present worship, as the guidelines and expectations have changed. We will continue to need a

spirit of flexibility. We come back together, knowing that we have not returned to where we were in 2019.

We will also need to embrace this flexibility as we move forward in watching all the presented factors. There could be a point where things ramp up again, and the numbers get out of control. If this happens, then we will once again need to consider being remote only. I hope and pray this does not occur. But knowing the course of this virus, we should be prepared to be flexible in our work together. Let us embrace the flexibility necessary to navigate this time in our lives. God is with us in this and is active in the flexibility of the circumstances.

Are you ready for 2020 to be over? There is something about the start of a new calendar year that gives us the idea that we have a clean slate, a chance for something new. Our society encourages us to use the turning of the calendar to make resolutions and potentially reinvent ourselves, our careers, or other places in our lives

Were you aware that about 50% of Americans make New Year resolutions but statistically, only 10% keep them? (Why we make (and break) New Year's resolutions, and 4 tips to help you achieve your goals, Western Connecticut Health Network, December 07, 2020)

I have watched many people start a resolution (for the New Year or at any time) and find themselves frustrated when they cannot fulfill them. Does this mean we shouldn't make resolutions?

No! It is a great way to practice grace and forgiveness with yourself and an opportunity for self-examination. As Christians, we have self-examination as part of our Lenten practice. We also practice self-examination during confession and forgiveness.

What we don't do well is offer grace and forgiveness of ourselves. Sometimes we are not even willing to accept God's grace and forgiveness. Maybe because we feel unworthy, did not try hard enough; you could probably create your own list. One of the joys we have as Baptized Children of God is that each moment of each day is a chance to start again. We are not captive to a calendar or clock to tell us when we can reestablish a resolution. We are "born anew" in baptism. We are not trapped by our sin to an old way of life. God invites us to see each moment of each day as a new opportunity to try again. To leave the "Old Adam," our sinful self, behind and "put on Christ." To acknowledge our sins and failings and begin again.

Whether you make formal resolutions, create a dream board, write your hopes and plans in a journal, or do none of the above. You are given each moment of every day to walk as a disciple of Christ. A claimed child of God. You can go in a new direction at any time.

Will your "Old Adam" try to trip you up? Yep, every time. But the grace and love of God are with you. You already have access to God's grace. Practice grace and forgiveness to yourself and continue in the actions that bring you health, life, and share the Good News of God in the world.

### JANUARY 2021—The Word of God in Worship

## January 3, 2021 SECOND SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS INTRODUCTION

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Almighty God, you have filled all the earth with the light of your incarnate Word. By your grace empower us to reflect your light in all that we do, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

# January 10, 2021 BAPTISM OF OUR LORD INTRODUCTION

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Holy God, creator of light and giver of goodness, your voice moves over the waters. Immerse us in your grace, and transform us by your Spirit, that we may follow after your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

# SECOND SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY / LECTIONARY 2 INTRODUCTION

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.

Thanks be to you, Lord Christ, most merciful redeemer, for the countless blessings and benefits you give. May we know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day praising you, with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

# THIRD SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY / LECTIONARY 3 INTRODUCTION

As we continue through the time after Epiphany, stories of the call to discipleship show us the implications of our baptismal calling to show Christ to the world. Jesus begins proclaiming the good news and calling people to repentance right after John the Baptist is arrested for preaching in a similar way. Knowing that John was later executed, we see at the very outset the cost of discipleship. Still, the two sets of brothers leave everything they have known and worked for all their lives to follow Jesus and fish for people.

#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Almighty God, by grace alone you call us and accept us in your service. Strengthen us by your Spirit, and make us worthy of your call, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

# FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY / LECTIONARY 4 INTRODUCTION

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Compassionate God, you gather the whole universe into your radiant presence and continually reveal your Son as our Savior. Bring wholeness to all that is broken and speak truth to us in our confusion, that all creation will see and know your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.
