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# FROM PASTOR MUSE

"See I am making all things new!"
Revelation 21

This is such a glorious and wonderful time of year. We are straddling two distinct seasons with each of their best offerings. Summer is waning, but still has its best aspects to give. Family and friends can still gather around grills and backyard BBQs to enjoy each others company, celebrating the gift of love and connection. # FROM PASTOR THOMPSON

### **BUILDING THE KINGDOM**

<sup>9</sup> For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building. <sup>10</sup> According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. <sup>11</sup> For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. (1 Cor. 3:9–11).

Life as a disciple is to continue to build on the foundation laid through Jesus Christ. As Lutherans, we reject the notion that our good work is the cause for our salvation. Unfortunately, it sometimes leads us to think that we are free from work because we are already saved. Paul reminds us in the passage from First Corinthians that we are called to continue to build the kingdom of God.

Paul is reminding the Corinthian church that it does not matter who shared the gospel with you. But rather, what are you doing with the message of salvation. Are you building on the foundation? What resources are you using? Paul continues this passage, "12 Now if anyone builds on the

foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw—

13 the work of each builder will become visible, for the Day will disclose it, because it will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test what sort of work each has done." (1 Cor. 3:12-13)

How are we building on the foundation of Jesus? What are we doing to grow our faith? What are we doing to grow the kingdom?

Paul is explicit in stating that how we build will be clearly visible. What we build will show its longevity on the last Day.

We, individually and as a congregation, are building the kingdom today. What does it look like?

Join in, come for education, volunteer, and grow so we can grow the kingdom.

After many years of faithful service, our Director of Christian Education, Brianne Black, has decided to lay down her position. We are incredibly thankful to God for her gifts and years of service. Please be sure to thank her for her service and all that she has given to the church.

# **QUILTERS**

The quilters are still working, still in our pandemic mode.

We still have tops being made by Betty Lou and Sherrie, and found some of Sandy's. I've had rolls of batting delivered to my house and have tables set up so I can sandwich the tops, batting and backing sheets, which we have gotten lots of donations. They are top stitched and yarn put in, and we have a waiting list of people I meet at church, they take them home, tie and return to church.

Since January I have ordered six rolls of batting and have been getting 30 quilts from each roll. I will try to get at least one more roll in before quilts go out the second week of October.

Last year I got a lot of complaints why we send these overseas instead of keeping local. Pastor and I talked about this, he made some phone calls and I did some checking. We were told Alliance doesn't really have a "living in the streets" situation, even if we do have some homeless people these quilts are double bed size so even if used for a night or two they are too bulky for those toting all their belongings. Salvation Army doesn't really have a need for this size, nursing homes prefer the thin, easier to wash ones. I did put some in the Salvation Army drop box. Instead for nursing homes,

sometime in November Walmart has fleece blankets and some as low as \$5. When you see those fleece go on sale (those are actually a better buy than buying the fleece) we will give to as many nursing homes as we can. We had 65 blankets. Pastor and I choose AlterCare and when Gayle took them out they said they didn't know what they would do for their Christmas party for the residents.

Last year I sold two beautiful quilts to buy those fleece rolls. One buyer paid for the quilt but put it back in to resell. So we will again give our quilts to LWR. I've checked that they are helping in Haiti.

### <u>TIME AFTER PENTECOST — LECTIONARY 27</u> INTRODUCTION

Today's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Sovereign God, you have created us to live in loving community with one another. Form us for life that is faithful and steadfast, and teach us to trust like little children, that we may reflect the image of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. READINGS AND PSALM Genesis 2:18-24, Psalm 8 You crown us with glory and honor. (Ps. 8:5), Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12, Mark 10:2-16

### <u>TIME AFTER PENTECOST — LECTIONARY 28</u> INTRODUCTION

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Almighty and ever-living God, increase in us your gift of faith, that, forsaking what lies behind and reaching out to what lies ahead, we may follow the way of your commandments and receive the crown of everlasting joy, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

READINGS AND PSALM Amos 5:6-7, 10-15, Psalm 90:12-17, So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. (Ps. 90:12), Hebrews 4:12-16

# October 17, 2021 TIME AFTER PENTECOST — LECTIONARY 29

### INTRODUCTION

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

#### PRAYER OF THE DAY

Sovereign God, you turn your greatness into goodness for all the peoples on earth. Shape us into willing servants of your kingdom, and make us desire always and only your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 53:4-12, Psalm 91:9-16 You have made the LORD your refuge, and the Most High your habitation. (Ps. 91:9), Hebrews 5:1-10, Mark 10:35-45

### <u>TIME AFTER PENTECOST — LECTIONARY 30</u>

### INTRODUCTION

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers that be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"

Eternal light, shine in our hearts. Eternal wisdom, scatter the darkness of our ignorance. Eternal compassion, have mercy on us.
