FROM PASTOR MUSE

I remember early in my ministry one of the weekly Bible Study participants telling me a story. They were getting ready to come to Bible Study when their spouse asked them why they go, since they read through the whole Bible already. The reply was beautiful; "Yes", they said "the words were the same, but I was different."

There are two distinct views of the Bible and its impact in the world. The first states that the Bible is a closed book and that its words are no longer alive. It is just a document written centuries ago that has no real bearing or weight on the world today. This also means that its teaching, though they may be relevant to certain situations, are only relevant by coincidence and should not be read too deeply. There are those who believe this and teach this understanding of the Bible.

The second view of the Bible, one held by us as Lutherans, is that the Bible is a living document, that is still breathing life into us today. Yes, the Bible has been closed, as the previous belief structure would indicate, there will be no additions to or subtractions from the words of the holy book, but that closure does not indicate death. Just because there will be no alteration to the text, does not mean the book stops speaking. This is because every time we read it, we are different.

When we open the Bible, we are different people. We are in different places, experiencing different emotions, facing different challenges. Every day, if we are honest with ourselves, we are different in certain aspects because the word around us is different. It may be a slight shift from yesterday or a massive swath from the week before, so when the book is opened, we come to it with different eyes. We read it with a sense of wonder or hope for direction in a certain moment. We seek in its pages guidance to deal with relationship issues or words of encouragement when we are down. We look to it for wisdom or peace when we are confused. We come to this book different each day, so we should come to the book each day.

The Bible has words to speak into every circumstance we face. It may not be a direct receipt for success, but it will offer a framework to deal with what every we face. We just have to seek it out every day. Dwelling in the Word will open us to the wisdom and guidance it brings to all circumstances.

I believe we should search the scriptures when we need specific direction, for God has given us such a gift, but we

FAVORITE BIBLE VERSE(S)

Do you have a favorite Bible verse? Or maybe a couple of beloved Bible verses? Have you considered why it/they are your favorites?

When did you learn it? What did it mean for you at the time? What does it say to you now? Have your favorites changed over time?

The joy of God's Word is the diversity and complexity of the stories and messages. There are stories and verses that connect to every human emotion. The more time we spend reading the Bible, the more we see the work of God. We can connect the emotions and experiences of the people in the Bible to our life today.

The beloved stories and verses of our youth don't stop being valuable but instead take on deeper meaning. We also connect to new stories and verse that speak to the changes and responsibilities of life.

If you are already reading a daily devotion (connected to Scripture) or daily reading the Bible, congratulations! If you are not, I ask you to take 5 minutes a day to read a daily devotion or a passage from the Bible. Even 5 minutes a day will connect you to God. If you are not a reader, how about

listening to the Bible?

Do it at the time of day that works best for you. For me, it is in the morning or during lunch. If I wait until bedtime, it isn't going to happen.

Will it seem difficult at first? Possibly. Making a new habit and starting a new commitment will take some adjustment. Like any life-giving habit, scripture reading may feel awkward. Over time it will feel as natural as the time you make to brush your teeth or get ready for the day.

Not sure where or how to start? I would start with Mathew, Mark, or Luke. The joy of the Bible is you have a whole library in one place. What book sounds the most interesting to you? Start there!

Do you still have questions? That is ok. Come talk to me. I am happy to help you find a ritual that works for you.

<u>July 3, 2022</u> <u>TIME AFTER PENTECOST—LECTIONARY 14</u> INTRODUCTION

July 10, 2022 TIME AFTER PENTECOST—LECTIONARY 15 INTRODUCTION

To love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, strength, and mind is to reflect God's mercy in responding to one's neighbor. That mercy found its most profound expression in the "gospel that has come to you"—namely the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.
