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FROM PASTOR MUSE

"For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery." — Galatians 5:1

We live in a world that talks a lot about freedom—freedom of speech, freedom of choice, freedom to be ourselves. But as Christians, we understand that not all freedom is the same. Some so-called freedoms can actually enslave us: the pressure to always succeed, the need to prove our worth, the weight of trying to be "good enough." These burdens quietly creep in and rob us of the joy Christ came to give.

Paul's words in Galatians 5:1 are a loud and loving reminder: Christ has already set us free. Not someday. Not if we get our act together. Not if we prove we deserve it. He has already done it—on the cross, in His resurrection, and in the waters of our baptism.

This freedom is at the heart of our faith. We are saved by grace through faith, not by our works (Ephesians 2:8-9). That means our worth, our identity, and our standing before God do not depend on how well we perform, but on what Christ has already done for us. Luther called this being "simul justus et peccator"—at the same time righteous and sinner. We're not perfect, but we are perfectly loved.

Still, the temptation is strong to put the

chains back on. Maybe it's guilt from the past, fear of the future, or the endless striving to please everyone around us. Paul's call is clear: Stand firm. Don't go back. Don't let guilt, shame, or legalism take the place of God's grace.

So what does living in this freedom look like?

- · It looks like resting in God's promises, even on the days you feel like a mess.
- · It looks like forgiving others because you know how deeply you've been forgiven.
- · It looks like waking up each day knowing that your value isn't in your performance but in your Savior.

And it looks like serving others—not out of obligation or to earn anything, but because you're already free to love.

As we walk together in faith, let's remind one another of the freedom we have in Christ. Let's be a church where grace is more than a word—it's our foundation. And let's never forget: in Christ, we are already free. Free to live. Free to love. Free to be God's own.

Stand firm in that freedom—because it's yours, today and always.

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. 2 He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. (Luke 10:1-2)

As we enter the heart of summer, we are starting to see local fruits and vegetables growing. The passage above is part of our readings for July 6. It is an excellent reminder that even though plants produce according to God's design, they cannot provide food if there is no one to harvest them.

Jesus uses the metaphor of harvest and the seventy-two as laborers to remind us that the Word of God needs laborers to harvest the work God has already started. We are the laborers sent into the world to help those whom God has made Godself known. We are not growing the fruit of God's kingdom; we are co-workers with Christ in connecting God's action to people's lives.

God is always at work in the world. We are sharing the Good News to reinforce what God has already done. Millions of people are waiting to know they are loved without condition. They are waiting to hear that hope is genuine and not a fantasy.

We are all called to move from our place of comfort into the work that God has set for all followers of Jesus. Go! Be a laborer in God's world (the fields) so that God's harvest is gathered and plentiful.
