FROM PASTOR MUSE

"And the one who was seated on the throne said, This is good news in a world that feels 'See, I am making all things new.'"— Revelation 21:5

Advent begins with a promise: God is not finished with us yet. The world is still in God's hands, and in Christ, God declares a future that is not defined by our failures, fears, or brokenness. In Revelation 21:5, God speaks a word that echoes across Scripture and history—"I am making all things new." Not "some things." Not "just the things we manage to fix." All things.

Advent reminds us that God's newness does not depend on our perfection or progress. It begins with God stepping into our darkness with light, into our chaos with peace, into our weary world with hope. Luther often reminded the Church that God works most powerfully in unexpected places—in a manger, in a cross, in ordinary bread and wine. God's newness rarely arrives with fanfare. It comes quietly, steadily, faithfully, exactly where we need it most.

We often think of waiting as a passive act. But Advent teaches us that Christian waiting is active, hopeful, and expectant. We watch for God's movement not with idle hands but with open hearts. We wait with trust that God is already doing a new thing—even if we cannot yet see its full shape.

- · exhausted by conflict,
- · exhausted by political division,
- · exhausted by personal burdens,
- · exhausted by the weight of "never enough."

We live in a time when many people feel stuck—stuck in old habits, old wounds, old fears. Advent interrupts us with a divine reminder: "You are not stuck. God is not done. A new thing is coming."

Lutheran theology teaches that we live as both saint and sinner—broken, yet beloved; flawed, yet redeemed. The "new thing" God promises in Revelation is not only about heaven someday; it begins now. Christ is born into our real lives, not our ideal ones. He enters the messiness of our daily routines—the bills, the stress, the caregiving, the worries, the hopes we hardly dare to voice.

Where do you feel the need for newness this Advent? Where in your life do you long for God's renewing work? Perhaps the new thing God is bringing is:

- · healing where you carry grief,
- · courage where you feel fear,
- · forgiveness where you hold regret,
- · reconciliation where there is distance,
- · rest where you feel worn thin. God's promise is not that we make

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ourselves new, but that Christ makes us new, day by day, moment by moment, breath by breath.

Revelation 21 is not spoken to an isolated believer but to a community struggling with uncertainty. God promises not just individual renewal but a renewed creation, a renewed people, a renewed hope.

In our own congregation, God continues to do a new thing. It shows up in the courage of people serving others, in ministries that grow quietly behind the scenes, in friendships newly formed, in children learning the story of Jesus, in prayers whispered for neighbors and strangers alike. It shows up in every act of love that contradicts the world's cynicism.

Advent invites us to join God's new thing by living as people of hope. Not hollow optimism, but deep trust that Christ's light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.

Today's world craves novelty—new products, new updates, new trends. Yet spiritual newness is different. It is not disposable. It is not temporary. God's "new thing" is restorative, healing, and rooted in Christ's unchanging love.

In a culture that runs at an relentless pace, Advent says, slow down. In a world that rewards self-reliance, Advent says, look to Christ. In an age of anxiety, Advent says, hope is still possible. In a time of division, Advent says, light still breaks in.

The new thing God brings does not erase the past; it redeems it. It does not deny our wounds; it heals them. It does not demand perfection; it offers grace.

Does the Hero's Backstory Matter?

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; (Isaiah 9:6)

Pastor Tim, Kate, and I like superhero stories. We celebrate the idea that Good wins over Evil. We get invested in the stories of the heroes and the villains.

If you feel that superheroes are not worth spending time on, I recommend considering how we talk about Jesus. Jesus is a superhero story. He is a person who works for the good of all he encounters. Some people are actively seeking Jesus' failure or trying to turn the people against him. For Jesus, it was the religious leaders. For the superheroes in modern stories, it could be a Lex Luthor, Ed Nigma (The Riddler), or Dr. Octavius. The villains are coming from places of self-serving decisions or misguided use of their powers.

One of the main reasons that superheroes become popular is because they call us to a better understanding of how someone with extraordinary power can still be committed to the greater good.

Our understanding of Jesus is remarkably similar. Jesus, born human and divine, has the power to grant healing, forgiveness, and even to resurrect others. His most significant work was his self-sacrifice. Like many superhero stories, Jesus does not seem like the hero type. He was born into a family of low social status and without wealth.

Yet, he is the great bringer of hope, peace, justice, salvation, and eternal life. His power is used to love, serve, and save us all. Jesus did not need to fly, swing from spider webs, or even have wealth to build amazing gadgets. His power is in his very nature, God and Human!

As we move to Christmas, remember the most incredible superhero story of all time! The Birth, Life, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus. The savior of the whole world.

Sunday, December 7, 2025 Introduction

Introduction

A note of joyful expectation marks today's worship. Isaiah announces that the desert shall rejoice and blossom, and Jesus points to the unexpected and transforming signs of God's reign. We wait with patience for the coming of the Lord, even as we rejoice at his presence among us this day: in word and holy supper, in church and in our homes, in silent reflection and in works of justice and love. We pray that God would open our eyes and ears to the wonders of Christ's advent among us.

Stir up the wills of all who look to you, Lord God, and strengthen our faith in your coming, that, transformed by grace, we may walk in your way; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Sunday, December 21, 2025

Introduction

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-withus. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this

final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

Prayer of the Day

Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come. With your abundant grace and might, free us from the sin that hinders our faith, that eagerly we may receive your promises, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.** Readings and Psalm Isaiah 7:10-16 The sign of Immanuel Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19 Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. Wednesday, December 24, 2025

Introduction

In winter's deepest night, we welcome the light of the Christ child. Isaiah declares that the light of the long-promised king will illumine the world and bring endless peace and justice. Paul reminds us that the grace of God through Jesus Christ brings salvation to all people. The angels declare that Jesus' birth is good and joyful news for everyone, including lowly shepherds. Filled with the light that shines in our lives, we go forth to share the light of Christ with the whole world.

Prayer of the Day

Almighty God, you made this holy night shine with the brightness of the true Light. Grant that here on earth we may walk in the light of Jesus' presence and in the last day wake to the brightness of his glory; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Introduction

As we celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas, our gospel today confronts us with the death of innocent children at the hands of Herod. The birth of Christ does not remove the power of evil from our world, but its light gives us hope as we walk with all the "holy innocents" of past generations and today who have suffered unjustly. In our gathering around word and meal, God continues to redeem us, lift us up, and carry us as in days of old.

Prayer of the Day

O Lord God, you know that we cannot place our trust in our own powers. As you protected the infant Jesus, so defend us and all the needy from harm and adversity, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**
