FROM PASTOR MUSE

And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Hebrews 10:24-25

Last month I introduced the concept of discerning what the church means to you. I asked each of you to contemplate this question. I said that I would be using this space over the next year to talk about how the church needs the members as much as the members need the church. This is a symbiotic relationship between people and the faith community. If the faith community is not serving the people, then the relationship is fractured. If the people are not supporting the faith community, then the relationship is fractured. Hence the nature of a relationship, a two-sided exchange, which is mutually beneficial.

The first point of focus I want to bring forward to "stay connected." This is foundational to any relationship, to be present, to be part of the actions of the other. For a relationship to grow and strengthen, it requires interaction. This is also true of the relationship with God and the faith community, from both sides. Our lives are enhanced, and our spirits grow when we engage the community. The community is strengthened by your presence in it. As I stated last month, the faith community is a husk without the people. The congregation needs you as

much as you need the congregation! It is challenging to grow with each other and support each other when we are not together for extended periods. The work of the community falters when its members are not present and engaged. Staying connected is foundational to the enhancement of the faith community and the work of God's kingdom.

Staying connected takes work and investment. It requires decision making that places the work of the community and your place in the community above other things. Like any other relationship of importance, making time for the church is just as important as the church providing resources for you. Examining one's schedule and time investment to ensure that proper amounts of time are available to support the work of the church is one of the ways to stay connected. Setting aside a specific time each week for the faith community and then making decisions to support that time set aside for the church. The faith community needs its members to make it a priority so that the work can continue, and the kingdom of God can more fully be expressed.

Keeping other things from gaining importance over the church is another way to stay connected. Many things draw on our time, and they have validity and meaning. It is through the faith community that our relationship with God is enhanced. Working to keep God at the top of our priority list can be difficult, for there are many other things that can intrude. Yet the task of the believer is to keep God a that the top. We strive to push aside anything else that wants to claim the top spot in our lives.

The final piece I want to raise in staying connected is breathing through the disagreements with grace and love. Like any relationship, we will not agree on everything, and some challenges will require negotiation and compromise. Staying connected to the faith community is a commitment to the community above the disagreement. Sometimes leaving is necessary, but many times it can be overcome by conversation and love. Don't let a dispute or a disappointment keep you from the faith community. Resolve to work it out and find a path of resolution. Stay connected! "Stay in the boat," as Paul would say and let us weather the storms of life together. The faith community needs you just as much as you need it.

CHRISTMAS OR CHAOS

I thoroughly enjoy the lights, music, gift-giving, and worship of Advent and Christmas. What I struggle with are the crazy busy days that result from the addition of events. I know many of you have schedules like my family. Work, education for children or yourself, children's and your own commitments, the list goes on. When the Holiday Season arrives our schedules rarely adjust for the holiday expectations.

If you don't have this experience during the Christmas season, I am thankful. Or you may find that you thrive on the added opportunities.

The questions for me and how I keep my focus on faith is, "How will I prioritize my expectations of the season?" For myself, this includes saying, "No" to some invitations. It may consist of attending an event but leaving early. I chose to do this not to make myself look "too important" to stay, but because I know that it is right for my physical and emotional wellbeing.

You may want to hibernate through the Christmas season. Maybe you are grieving, physically, emotionally, or spiritually overwhelmed. Give yourself grace and practice gentleness with yourself. It is ok to opt-out of some events and activities. Pick and chose the ones that you know will be most life-giving and joy-filled.

If you are concerned about a friend, family member, or neighbor who looks like they are hibernating, invite them but give them the space to say, "No." Maybe an invitation to one-on-one coffee or lunch may be the blessing they need rather than a big gathering where they may feel the need to put on a false front.

Whether you are excited, ready to hide, or somewhere in between, one thing we all can do is set realistic expectations for the season. For me, this includes a realistic budget for gifts, building into my schedule evenings or afternoons of rest, and remembering that nothing needs to be "perfect." Christ was born and will return. The

number, size, or cost of gifts, parties, or meals will not change this truth.

When the social pressure to "do Christmas" becomes too much, remember, God already did Christmas. The vital work is done. God is born in human flesh and dwells with us. "Emmanuel"

If you are overwhelmed, grieving, or otherwise, not feeling like Christmas, call me. We can talk, cry, and explore how you can reclaim Christmas.

Remember EMMANUEL=God with us!

DECEMBER 2019—THE WORD OF GOD IN WORSHIP

<u>December 1, 2019 FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT</u> INTRODUCTION

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come. By your merciful protection save us from the threatening dangers of our sins, and enlighten our walk in the way of your salvation, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122, *I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the LORD." (Ps. 122:1)*, Romans 13:11-14, Matthew 24:36-44

<u>December 8, 2019 SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT</u> INTRODUCTION

At the heart of our Advent preparation stands John the Baptist, who calls us to repent and make a new beginning. As the darkness increases we turn toward the approaching light of Christ. For Christians he is the root of Jesse, the righteous judge who welcomes all, especially the poor and meek of the earth. We wait with hope for that day when the wolf will dwell with the lamb, and there will be no more hurt or destruction. From the Lord's table we are sent in the spirit of John the Baptist to proclaim that in Christ the kingdom of God has come near.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Stir up our hearts, Lord God, to prepare the way of your only Son. By his coming nurture our growth as people of repentance and peace; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 11:1-10, Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19, May the righteous flourish; let there be an abundance of peace. (Ps. 72:7), Romans 15:4-13, Matthew 3:1-12

December 15, 2019 THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

INTRODUCTION

A note of joyful expectation marks today's worship. Isaiah announces that the desert shall rejoice and blossom, and Jesus points to the unexpected and transforming signs of God's reign. We wait with patience for the coming of the Lord, even as we rejoice at his presence among us this day: in word and holy supper, in church and in our homes, in silent reflection and in works of justice and love. We pray that God would open our eyes and ears to the wonders of Christ's advent among us.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Stir up the wills of all who look to you, Lord God, and strengthen our faith in your coming, that, transformed by grace, we may walk in your way; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 35:1-10, Psalm 146:5-10, *The LORD lifts up those who are bowed down. (Ps. 146:8)*

Luke 1:46b-55 (Alternate), My spirit rejoices in God my Savior. (Luke 1:47), James 5:7-10, Matthew 11:2-11

<u>December 22, 2019 FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT</u> INTRODUCTION

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, God-with-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come. With your abundant grace and might, free us from the sin that hinders our faith, that eagerly we may receive your promises, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 7:10-16, Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19, Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. (Ps. 80:7)

Romans 1:1-7, Matthew 1:18-25

<u>December 24, 2019 NATIVITY OF OUR LORD, CHRISTMAS EVE (I)</u>

INTRODUCTION

In winter's deepest night, we welcome the light of the Christ child. Isaiah declares that the light of the long-promised king will illumine the world and bring endless peace and justice. Paul reminds us that the grace of God through Jesus Christ brings salvation to all people. The angels declare that Jesus' birth is good and joyful news for everyone, including lowly shepherds. Filled with the light that shines in our lives, we go forth to share the light of Christ with the whole world.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

Almighty God, you made this holy night shine with the brightness of the true Light. Grant that here on earth we may walk in the light of Jesus' presence and in the last day wake to the brightness of his glory; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 9:2-7, Psalm 96, *Let the heavens rejoice and the earth be glad. (Ps. 96:11)*

Titus 2:11-14, Luke 2:1-14 [15-20]

<u>December 29, 2019 FIRST SUNDAY OF CHRISTMAS</u> INTRODUCTION

As we celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas, our gospel today confronts us with the death of innocent children at the hands of Herod. The birth of Christ does not remove the power of evil from our world, but its light gives us hope as we walk with all the "holy innocents" of past generations and today who have suffered unjustly. In our gathering around word and meal, God continues to redeem us, lift us up, and carry us as in days of old.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

O Lord God, you know that we cannot place our trust in our own powers. As you protected the infant Jesus, so defend us and all the needy from harm and adversity, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

READINGS AND PSALM Isaiah 63:7-9,Psalm 148, The splendor of the LORD is over earth and heaven. (Ps. 148:13)

Hebrews 2:10-18, Matthew 2:13-23
