There is a saying that "Stewardship is everything we do after we say we believe." What is the "everything" described in this saying? Just things that seem religious, churchy, biblical? Stewardship can be a lofty word. The practice of Stewardship is in every decision, large or small we make in a day and over a lifetime.
