FROM PASTOR MUSE

The summer months usually offer the community of faith a time of rest and renewal. BETTER THE DEVIL YOU KNOW THAT THE POSSIBILITY OF SOMETHING NEW.

The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." (Exodus 16:3, *NRSV*)

When it comes to change, it is easier to bear the complex reality of the moment than the risk of change. The descendants of Israel wandered the wilderness for 40 years, waiting for God to fulfill God's promise. When God is working something new in us, it is easier to fall back into old patterns. When God is working on us, and the results are not immediate, that makes it even more difficult.

Research shows that it takes over 10,000 hours to master a new skill. The fact that we are not automatically proficient, let alone a master of a skill, habit, or thought, is part of the reason change is difficult. When part of our lives change, it will take time to relearn how our lives are.

We naturally want to return to what is known even if we know that is not our best choice. It is the easiest option. A life of faith is filled with change and growth within ourselves and our congregation. We want the familiar, but that is not always where we need to be.

Think back to a time when you experienced a rapid change in your life—perhaps a positive one, like moving to a new home or getting a promotion at work. It's likely that you felt a bit disoriented as you adjusted to the new circumstances. You made it through, but it's also possible that you looked back at where you were and thought, even for a moment, "My life was easier when _____." It may have seemed more straightforward because it was familiar.

Remember, you couldn't have lived that experience your entire life. We can't grow as people or as disciples if we refuse to change. Just as God journeyed with the descendants of Israel, God continues to journey with us, providing the comfort and guidance we need in times of change. God provides what we need but does not deny us the discomfort of growth.

May God's presence surround you and remind you that growth and change are not to be avoided. Instead, let us embrace all that God has in store for us.


Check out all the wonderful resources our library has to offer. There are many items that can enhance your journey of faith.

JULY 2024—The Word of God in Worship

<u>Sunday, July 7, 2024</u> Introduction

Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

Prayer of the Day

God of the covenant, in our baptism you call us to proclaim the coming of your kingdom. Give us the courage you gave the apostles, that we may faithfully witness to your love and peace in every circumstance of life, in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

<u>Sunday, July 14, 2024</u> Introduction

When Amos reports his vision of God judging Israel for its mistreatment of the poor, he becomes a threat to the power of the priests and the king. John the Baptist also speaks truth to power, and Herod has him killed. In Herod's fear that Jesus is John returned from the dead, we may hear hope for the oppressed: all the prophets killed through the ages are alive in Jesus. We are called to witness to justice in company with them, and to proclaim God's saving love.

Prayer of the Day

O God, from you come all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works. Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, that our hearts may be set to obey your commandments; and also that we, being defended from the fear of our enemies, may live in peace and quietness, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

<u>Sunday, July 21, 2024</u> Introduction

Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

Prayer of the Day

O God, powerful and compassionate, you shepherd your people, faithfully feeding and protecting us. Heal each of us, and make us a whole people, that we may embody the justice and peace of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

<u>Sunday, July 28, 2024</u> Introduction

Today is the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

Prayer of the Day

Gracious God, you have placed within the hearts of all your children a longing for your word and a hunger for your truth. Grant that we may know your Son to be the true bread of heaven and share this bread with all the world, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.
