FROM PASTOR MUSE

FROM "WHY IS IT?" TO "HOW CAN I?"

There are two main ways we engage most situations, either passively or actively.

Passive is when we put the power of the circumstance or outcome in the control of another. It is the responsibility of another to tend to or accomplish a task, and others passively stand by and judge, critique or otherwise have little investment in the circumstance. Examples are comments: "Why is this the way it is?" "Why hasn't this been done, thought of, spoken about?" These thoughts and comments put accountability on another person. The questioner is in a place of judgment about the circumstance or action. We all do this in areas where we inherently have little control; politics, finance, sports. We can also do it in areas of our lives where we have power, but we have chosen to abdicate control or decide to have little investment in a circumstance. Areas such as "Why hasn't this task been done?" "Why aren't I being made to feel the way I want to feel?" The list could go on and on. We passively give over power to another and then judge how the other uses the power we give them.

The second path is an active investment in a circumstance or situation. We actively take power given to us and use it for a different outcome. We do this by changing how we think or ask about the circumstances surrounding us — doing so in such a way that we claim our power. The shift is simple, but it is very profound. It is moving from the "Why is it/Why isn't it?" questions to "How can I?" question. How can I impact this situation or circumstance? How can I influence this decision or path? "How can I" is an active question containing involvement and investment. How can I influence the decisions made in our country? How can I change the way I feel about myself? How can I move my life forward? How can I?

Jesus invested in this active approach to our relationship with God. Before his birth, people's relationship with God was passive. A believer went to the priest and then left the God-stuff to them. The people were very disconnected and depended on the leader/teacher to do the heavy lifting. Their place with God was passive, and their investment in the kingdom was minimal. Jesus came to bring active participation in the relationship between God and a person. Repentance, acts of piety, grace through faith, carrying the cross, following the savior are all active investments which

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lead to the question of "How can I?" How can I be closer to God? How can I aid the coming of the kingdom? How can I speak to God on a more intimate level? How can I?

This vertical shift in our relationship with God also extends horizontally in our interaction with God's community. God has not crafted the church to be a passive place of asking "Why" and letting others do the work. God has crafted the community to be a place of active investment and participation.

When all of the members of God's

community actively invest in the work of the community, with whatever gifts God has instilled in them, the community prospers and grows. When a member sees a need or something missing, God is not waiting for them to ask, "Why." God is seeking the member to ask, "How?" How can I fix this? How can I impact this? How can I make a difference? How can I work to bring about the kingdom in this place? Asking "How?" and acting on the answer, is the active investment God is seeking from every person who comes to the altar of grace.

When you find yourself in God's community and begin to ask "Why" because something is out of place or not prospering, stop and rethink the question. Ask God to transform the question from "Why" to "How." How can I help God? How can I make a difference in your community? How can I make a difference in your kingdom? How can I have an impact? And then listen for the answer, because God will answer that question, much quicker than God will answer the Why.

FROM PASTOR THOMPSON

BEING A REFORMATION CHURCH IN TIMES OF CULTURAL CHANGE.

At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" ² He called a child, whom he put among them, ³ and said, "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. 4 Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. ⁵ Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. (Matthew 18:1-5, NRSV)

How open are we to learning? Martin Luther was a life-long student. He pursued answers to the questions and doubts that plagued him. He studied and prayed! He was aware of the world around him and often commented on it. (We now reject some of those comments because of the inherent cultural biases of Luther and his time.)

Yet, we also recognize the power of this quote for Karl Barth, theologian: "Take your Bible and take your newspaper, and read both. But interpret newspapers from your Bible." (Time Magazine, May 1, 1966)— Karl Barth

How we read scripture actively influences how we "read and Peace, interpret" our current situation. We are called to bring our understanding of God, grace, mercy, and salvation into every part of our lives. This includes how we look at the news, the challenge of providing safety, shelter, and wellness to all people.

We, just like Martin, also carry the biases of our upbringing and culture. We are to be critical of ourselves, and strive not to confuse religious traditions and cultural assumptions with the word of God. It is not an easy task! It is difficult because we need to question ourselves and what we are trained to believe about others and ourselves.

The critical action of self-reflection is to first assume a posture of learning. To be humble enough to accept that we don't have all the answers and can learn from others. Change can only occur when we are willing to let go of long -held beliefs. Jesus spent his time with his disciples beginning this very process in them. To invite them into a new world-view and through that change the ability to reimage creation, community, faith, and salvation.

God, help us to child-like in faith, hungry for new knowledge and ready to grow in new and unexpected ways! Amen.
