## FROM PASTOR MUSE

to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen.

#### Luke 24:5

It will not be long before we hear those words publicly spoken, as we celebrate the resurrection. The wilderness of Lent is fading into the light of the resurrection, and we will lift our voices and sing the song of new life. It will be glorious to hear those words and be reminded of the victory won in the rising of Jesus Christ. Death has lost its hold on us and so we can freely release our hold on it.

The work of God is incredible and life giving, but the work of humans can be something different. We will hear the words of new life, but we can very easily and almost longingly hold on to the old death that resides in us. There is comfort in the old pain and brokenness that we have allowed to grow in us over the years, to the point that releasing it can cause us discomfort or even fear. We have gotten used to the pain and the patterns of brokenness and learned to live our lives around them, so to embrace the true gift of new life we release those places of brokenness. The process of embracing something new means letting go of something old.

The women were terrified and bowed their faces The idea of releasing the old patterns may be enticing to us, but the actual process is work and it requires a commitment to love, forgiveness and compassion. We can't fully change by hating something, we come to the place of loving ourselves in our pain and brokenness then out of that love seek to embrace the patterns of new life the stream forth from the divine. God loves us not for what we will become, but for who we are and so we too love ourselves for who we are, then seek to become who God desires us to be.


> This process requires forgiveness. We have all made mistakes, tried and failed, saw things through lenses of pain or betrayal, and acted accordingly. This is life in human form, and to better ourselves in light of Christ's rising we seek to forgive ourselves for the brokenness we have caused, as well as those who have hurt us in their own pain and brokenness. We experience forgiveness pouring into us from a loving God and we can use it as an example on how to offer it to ourselves and others.

We hear God say to us, my child, I love you for who you are, and I will be with you as you walk this path of faith. You will stumble and fall, but I am here to be with you. God gives us great compassion and wants us to be compassionate to ourselves, as we try to walk closer to the risen Christ. It can be difficult to let go of

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old patterns, even when they don't serve us or our faith. God has compassion for us, so that we can have compassion for ourselves and others who are journeying through life. You are invited, as you dwell in the joy of Easter, to be a new creation and strive to live into that newness with the power of God. Soon Lent will be over and Easter will begin, when it does you are free to release Lent fully and walk into the light of Christ's rising.

#### Sunday, April 6, 2025

**Introduction** Our God makes all things new. In the first reading God promises it. In the gospel Mary anticipates it, anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume in preparation for the day of his burial. In the second reading Paul recalls his transformation from the persecutor Saul into an apostle. In baptism, God's new person (you!) rises daily from the deadly mire of trespasses and sins.

**Prayer of the Day** Creator God, you prepare a new way in the wilderness, and your grace waters our desert. Open our hearts to be transformed by the new thing you are doing, that our lives may proclaim the extravagance of your love given to all through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

#### Sunday, April 13, 2025

**Introduction** Today we follow Christ from triumphal entry to the cross, each waypoint of the journey marked by Jesus' compassion for those who would betray, mock, accuse, or do violence to him. Though persecuted and beaten, Jesus the Son of God is not disgraced; instead, he asks forgiveness for those who put him to death. We have walked the Lenten pathway these forty days, each of us invited through baptism to "let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." We enter this holy week accompanying Jesus to the cross with both grief and thanksgiving in our hearts, trusting in God's redeeming love.

**Prayer of the Day** Everlasting God, in your endless love for the human race you sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take on our nature and to suffer death on the cross. In your mercy enable us to share in his obedience to your will and in the glorious victory of his resurrection, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen. Readings and Psalm Isaiah 50:4-9a** The servant of the LORD submits to suffering **Psalm 31:9-16** Into your hands, O LORD, I commend my spirit. (*Ps. 31:5*) **Philippians 2:5-11** Humbled to the point of death on a cross **Luke 22:14**—23:56 The passion of the Lord

#### Thursday, April 17, 2025 Maundy Thursday

**Introduction** This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.

**Prayer of the Day** Holy God, source of all love, on the night of his betrayal, Jesus gave us a new commandment, to love one another as he loves us. Write this commandment in our hearts, and give us the will to serve others as he was the servant of all, your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

#### Friday, April 18, 2025 Good Friday

**Introduction** Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

**Prayer of the Day** Almighty God, look with loving mercy on your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed, to be given over to the hands of sinners, and to suffer death on the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. **Amen. Readings and Psalm Isaiah 52:13—53:12** The suffering servant **Psalm 22** My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? (*Ps. 22:1*) **Hebrews 10:16-25** The way to God is opened by Jesus' death

John 18:1—19:42 The passion and death of Christ

#### Sunday, April 20, 2025 Resurrection of Our Lord:

**Introduction** "The last enemy to be destroyed is death," Paul writes. Today Christ is risen, and we gather together with astonishment and joy. Christ is risen, and we have been set free from the bonds of death. Christ is risen, and we are forgiven. Christ is risen, and with the women at the tomb and Peter, we are amazed. Let us rejoice: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

**Prayer of the Day** O God, you gave your only Son to suffer death on the cross for our redemption, and by his glorious resurrection you delivered us from the power of death. Make us die every day to sin, that we may live with him forever in the joy of the resurrection, through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

#### Sunday, April 27, 2025 Second Sunday of Easter

Introduction In spite of all we have heard and all we have seen, it is often hard to believe. Because it is hard to believe, we will invest ourselves in the Easter mystery for fifty days (a week of weeks). Because it is hard to believe, John the evangelist will provide sign after sign celebrating Jesus' victory over death. Because it is hard to believe, the risen Jesus will return to us again and again in the mystery of holy communion, inviting us to touch and taste his presence, and offering us his peace. Prayer of the Day O God of life, you reach out to us amid our fears with the wounded hands of your risen Son. By your Spirit's breath revive our faith in your mercy, and strengthen us to be the body of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
