FROM PASTOR MUSE

"This book of the law shall not depart out of your mouth; you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to act in accordance with all that is written in it. For then you shall make your way prosperous, and then you shall be successful." — Joshua 1:8 (NRSV)

When God spoke these words to Joshua, Israel stood on the edge of the Promised Land, about to begin a journey filled with uncertainty, challenge, and opportunity. The Lord's counsel was not a detailed military strategy or a motivational pep talk—it was a call to dwell in the Word.

In the Lutheran tradition, "meditating on the Word" is not simply repeating Bible verses until they become familiar. It's an ongoing, Spirit-led conversation between God and us, where Scripture shapes our hearts and directs our lives. Martin Luther often spoke of oratio, meditatio, tentatio—prayer, meditation, and trial—as the rhythm of a Christian's growth. Meditation is not an escape from life's demands but an immersion into God's truth so that we can meet life's demands with faith.

To meditate on God's Word "day and

night" means more than a morning devotion and a bedtime reading—it's weaving the promises, commands, and stories of Scripture into the very fabric of our daily living. We ponder a verse while washing dishes. We recall a psalm on the commute to work. We speak a word of Jesus' comfort to a friend in need. God's Word becomes the soundtrack of our thoughts and the compass for our decisions.

In a world overflowing with noise—social media posts, endless news cycles, and constant notifications—Scripture offers a different kind of voice: steady, true, and life-giving. Meditating on the Word slows us down, roots us in grace, and aligns our perspective with God's promises.

Joshua was told that prosperity and success would come from living according to God's Word. For us, this doesn't mean worldly wealth or an easy road, but a life rich in faith, guided by wisdom, and anchored in God's unchanging love through Jesus Christ.

Choose one verse—perhaps even Joshua 1:8—and keep it before you each day. Write it on a sticky note

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...shall meditate on it day and night...

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at your desk, set it as your phone background, or carry it in your pocket. Let it shape your prayers, influence your decisions, and comfort your heart.

As the psalmist reminds us, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). When we meditate on God's Word, we do not walk alone—the Lord walks with us.

WHY UPDATES OR EDITIONS OF THE BIBLE?

We all have our favorite translations of the Bible! Some like the King James (KJV) or New King James (NKJV), others like the Common English Version (CEV). In worship we have used the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV). You may or may not have noticed, we are now using the New Revised Standard Version: Update Edition (NRSVue).

I am sure there are questions as to why the change? What is different about the NRSVue?

From the *To the Reader* notes in the NRSVue: "The goal of the *NRSVue* is to offer a readable and accurate version of the Holy Bible to the global English-speaking community for public worship and personal study, for scholarship and study in classrooms, and for informing faith and action in response to God." And "The *NRSVue* extends the *New Revised Standard Version's* (*NRSV*) purpose to deliver an accurate, readable, up-to-date, and inclusive version of the Bible. It also continues the work of offering a version as free as possible from the gender bias inherent in the English language, which can obscure earlier oral and written renditions." *New Revised Standard Version: Updated Edition.* (2021). Friendship Press.

The NRSVue is the work of scholars of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA. The NRSV is more than

30 years old and reflects biases of the time; additionally, we have gained further insights into the ancient languages, the original texts, and culture of the Bible's authors. With this new understanding, it was time to review and bring that scholarly work to our translation.

You will hear and read the text with changes. The intention is to bring our new knowledge to a translation that better speaks to our modern understanding of language. Martin Luther was a huge advocate of Scripture being in the language that the ordinary person could hear or read. I believe that our continued changes to our translations, based on scholarly work, are vital to making Scripture more accessible.

Blessing to you as you continue to dive deeply into the Scriptures.

<u>Sunday, September 7, 2025</u> Introduction

Called to contemplate the cost of discipleship, we might be helped by translating Paul's request to Philemon into our prayer of the day: Refresh my heart in Christ.
