Going back to the earliest part of our existence, we are a species that is built on survival. We needed to be aware of our surroundings, our food supply, our closest neighbor, and a massive list of other things, all of which could cause us harm. As we have matured and grown in our awareness and access to resources our concern for such things is far less, but we still have a portion of our being that lives in such a way It is no longer played out in survival, it is played out in identifying and raising up the wrong, the mistake, or the thing that is out of place. We are far better at seeing the wrong than celebrating the right, because part of our ancestors still resides in us.

The darkness can be such a powerful part of our lives that we can begin to actively seek out the wrong, the broken, the dark and in that reside there in pain, struggle and unhappiness. The darkness can consume us and turn us into people we don't want to be. It can make us people who revel in the darkness, as well as drag others into that darkness. It can have significant detriment on our relationships, our world view, and even our sense of self. And when we choose to lean into that darkness, we are making a choice against leaning into God. Though God is present in the darkness, God is not defined as darkness, for Jesus tells us I am the light of the world. It is into the darkness of pain, struggle, and brokenness that Jesus brings the light of life.

As believers we are called to lean into the light. We are called to pull away from the darkness of despair, pain, struggle, or judgement, to seek out the light of the world and look at the world through Jesus' eyes. Though our Lord never denied the brokenness of the world, he focused on the gifts of life and the good things around him. He lifted up the lowly, fed the hungry, clothed the naked, and brought the good news to those who needed it, because he saw the light of God not just the darkness of sin. Jesus came and brought the light of hope, so that we would stop looking for the darkness around us.

We are called to this light. We are called to seek this light. We are called to seek out the hope of Christ and raise it up in all circumstances. We are called to be different, transformed by the resurrection of Christ. We are called to be Christ's living body in the world.

Answering this call is not easy. It requires work to learn how to see the light rather than dwell in the darkness. Through




