

Ten Rarest Gems on Earth (2 of 10)

2. Red Diamonds USD \$2-2.5 Million/Carat

With only 1 in every 10,000 diamond carats being colored, finding a large colored diamond is almost unheard of. Colorless diamonds are made of 100% carbon. For a diamond to be naturally colored it must come in contact with another mineral which reacts to the carbon producing a colored hue in the diamond - a process that is extremely rare. Approximately 20 % of colorless diamond carats found are gem quality. Of that percentage 1 out of every 10,000 carats is naturally colored. Only a very few red diamonds are ever found, and few people have seen even one treated red diamond. The gem is described as a purplish red, so it is not a pure red, crimson, vermilion, or scarlet. Nevertheless, for its size, it is one of the most expensive diamonds ever. The Argyle Mine in Australia produces a small number of red diamonds. The largest and finest of these are auctioned every year or two, and sell for millions of dollars. Currently it is believed that there are thirty-five flawless red diamonds known and most weigh under a carat. The largest is the Moussaieff Red (above right picture) at 5.11 carats, found by a Brazilian farmer.

Hints And Tips

Eliminating Flats by Ted Robles

A while back, someone was saying that he was having problems with getting "flats" on his cabs, that there was insufficient "give" in his wheels, and it didn't seem to make any difference no matter how much pressure he applied. That was his first mistake. Diamond and corundum are two different animals; relatively speaking, about the same difference as between quartz and chalk. If you "lean into" a diamond wheel, you will get lousy results (flats, etc.) on your stone, and your wheels will wear out long before their time. On diamond, you try to do your cutting (and everything else) by almost not touching the wheel. Use essentially no force. Don't "grind" the stone, let the diamond wear it away, but keep it spinning. The technique is simply to use the whole face of the wheel, and keep your cab moving. Any time you stop, you just bought a "flat". Can't help it! It's the same principle as sharpening a knife on an emery wheel. If you don't want notches in your blade, you keep it moving. Do almost all of your cutting on the coarsest wheel you have. If you leave any flats on the pre-form, you're going to have them on the final piece...can't help it. The RockCollector 2/08 via Stoney Statements From The Pineywoods


