

**Program will be:** PMC (Precious metal clay) Jewerly making. If you have a example, bring it along.

Precious Metal Clay, PMC, is an exciting material developed and patented in the 1990s by Mitsubishi Materials of Japan. Microscopic particles of silver are mixed with a moist binder to create a material that has the feel and working properties of modeling clay. Using simple tools, objects are easily given shape, texture, and character. After air-drying, the objects are heated to temperatures approaching the melting point of the metal, where the particles fuse together to make a dense, fully metallic object. Fired PMC work can be polished, soldered, enameled, and enjoyed like any other silver item. PMC is available in different versions of silver, Bronze, Copper and in a 22k gold alloy.

### **SHOP TIPS**

To remove the residue left on plastic items from price labels or other stickers, peanut butter, let set for a few hours, and rub with a paper towel. Presto! It's gone.

To Avoid losing snippets to be used for soldering, cut them inside a plastic bag.

Dopping wax becomes stiff and unmanageable after being heated and cooled many times. Add shavings from a candle to make it flow easily.

Dusty and Soiled stones can be cleaned to a bright polish with *Armor All*, an auto polish, and a soft cloth.

A good test for Jasper is to wet it. If it absorbs water and dries rapidly, throw it away; it will not polish. If it does not dry right away, it contains a high amount of chalcedony (quartz) and will take a good polish.

A simple and inexpensive way to clean quartz or amethyst crystals is to cover them with vinegar and let them stand for 24 hours. (Repeat as needed) Wash and rinse the crystals and soak them overnight in household ammonia. Rinse, dry and see them shine! Repeat as needed. Pickled quartz!

If you want to bring out the color and banding of Lake Superior agates without tumbling them, rub with heavy mineral oil and place on a cookie sheet in a 200 degree oven for 20 minutes. Remove and let cool. The results will surprise you.

If you have trouble with rock specimens scratching your glass display shelves, put three or four drops of silicon rubber on the bottom of troublemakers. Put them on wax paper while the rubber cures (24 hours).
