#### Ten Rarest Gems on Earth (8 of 10)

8. Red Beryl Emerald - Red beryl is found primarily in the Thomas Range and the Wah Wah Mountains of Utah, and has also been reportedly found in a location in Mexico (possibly near San Luis Potosi one of the very few places beryl is also found on rhyolite). Where it is found in Utah it occurs on rhyolite, where it crystallized under low pressure and high temperature, along fractures or cavities and porous areas of volcanic rhyolitic magma. Very few cut specimens exist.



#### **Safety First**

Things to look out for, like bees when you are out and about. All bees patrol a radius of up to  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile of their hive or swarm. They post up to 12 guards on lookout.

If they feel you are a threat to their swarm or hive, they'll "bump" you aggressively (but not sting you).

If you don't change direction, they will call for reinforcements. Then two or three bees sort of "pester" you. It is now time to change direction 180 degrees, or suffer stings.

If you discover a swarm:

- Don't panic, turn around and leave the area
- Call 911 if applicable

The best response is to leave them alone, if at all possible. They have a job to do and are really just trying to do it.

But, should you need it...

Dish washing detergent mixed 1 cup to a gallon of water and sprayed on to a swarm in a fine mist will suffocate them. Bees and most insects breathe thru their skin. They accept the spray/mist as rain and the detergent seals the air ducts and kills them.

#### **Singing Stones**

#### **Ringing Rocks County Park**

Location: Bridgeton Township, Bucks County
Physiography: Gettysburg-Newark Lowland Section
of the Piedmont Province

This park encompasses a diabase boulder field, one of the largest in the eastern United States. The boulder field formed during the Pleistocene Epoch ice ages (10,000 to 1.8 million years ago). Although this part of the state was not glaciated, the cold climate caused the ground to be frozen as permafrost. This tundra environment was accompanied by periglacial geologic activity, and the boulder field formed by two distinct periglacial processes. First, the well jointed (that is, fractured) diabase bedrock was progressively broken apart by cyclic freezing and thawing of water in the cracks (frost wedging). Second, these large fragments slowly moved down a gentle slope to accumulate into a field (solifluction). In the summer, the surficial ice would melt, and the water-saturated soil would lubricate the gradual creep of the boulders downhill on top of the permafrost.

Today the boulders field is called "Ringing Rocks" because the boulders emit distinct tones when struck by a hammer. This unusual property is a consequence of the iron content of the diabase. The size of the boulder and its contacts with the adjacent boulders also affect the sound.
