

Ten Rarest Gems on Earth (3 of 10)

3. Serendibite USD \$1.8-2 Million/Carat









This is a cyan colored stone that comes from Sri Lanka (Ceylon) – its full color range is blue, blue green, gray blue, light yellow, and dark blue. It is Pleochroic: Strong; X = pale yellow, yellow-green to blue-green; Y = almost colorless, pale yellow, blue, blue-green; Z = light to dark blue. Its name is derived from Serendib, the old Arabic name for Sri Lanka, as referenced in *The Sixth Voyage of Sinbad* and elsewhere. It is also found in New York and California, the Northwest Territories of Canada, Russia, Tanzania, and Madagascar. So far there exist only three faceted (cut) specimens of 0.35 carats, 0.55 carats and 0.56 carats. The first two were discovered by rare stone specialist D. P. Gunasekera and purchased by the late Prof. E. J. Gübelin of Switzerland. The larger of his two, shown above, far right, was sold for about \$14,300.00 per carat.

Bet You Didn't Know.....

WHAT'S SO SPECIAL ABOUT ARKANSAS QUARTZ CRYSTALS?

Arkansas quartz crystals are regarded as some of the world's finest. The quartz in the Ouachita Mountains contains very little contaminants. Water-clear quartz is the specialty and it is found throughout the mountains. Ron's Mine, the Old Coleman Mine, is distinguished not only as the largest producer, but also as the purest source for quartz crystal. The uniqueness of this deposit is a result of how the quartz developed. Most quartz has been formed through volcanic activity, where fractures on the earth's crust allowed hot silica-laden water based fluids, heated to high temperatures by volcanic activity, to leach into crevices within the earth. As the fluids passed along their route, contaminants were introduced by the various minerals these fluids came in contact with. When the fluids encountered favorable conditions, silica began to be deposited and from that quartz mineral grew.

Crystals found in the Ouachita Mountains are thought to have formed in a different and non-volcanic manner. The forces created during the building of the mountains are thought to have "squeezed" water from the underlying unit of shale and sandstone. Because of the depth of the burial of the sandstone and shale units (perhaps tens of thousands of feet) and also, as a result of high pressures developed within the sedimentary units during the mountain building process, water was heated to very high temperatures (260 degrees C/500 degrees F). This hot water, derived from trapped original sea water, was very different from fluids originating from igneous sources, in particular, it contained fewer dissolved minerals. You can easily see the difference if you compare samples of the crystals. Quartz from Brazil and Chile are both volcanic in origin. Although crystals from either source can be well formed, the difference in clarity is truly noticeable due to different conditions of growth.

Do You Think You Have Found A Meteorite?

Here Are Some Ways To Identify Meteorites! by Will Juvet

Meteorite I.D.

#1: the magnet test

Meteorites have three basic groups: iron, stone, and stony-iron. Almost all contain iron and nickel, so the first step is the magnet test. Iron and stony-iron meteorites will stick to a magnet.

Meteorite T.D. #2: weight

Iron is heavy so it should feel much heavier than a regular rock its size. It is another key way to identifying meteorites!

Meteorite I.D. #3 crust

When a meteoroid goes through our atmosphere, the meteoroid, now called a meteor, heats up a lot! The surface of the meteor will melt and give it a thin, dark crust called fusion crust. True fusion crust does not occur on normal rocks so it is a good way to identify meteorites.

Meteorite I.D. #4: regmaglypts

Regmaglypts or "thumbprints" are oval dents about the size of a peanut on the surface of many meteorites. This also happens to meteors during their trip through earth's atmosphere. It is another way to identify meteorites.

The only way to be sure you have a meteorite is to go to a lab, but you still can be pretty sure you might have one if your specimen matches at least 3 out of the 4 characteristics I have listed.



Friday Set-up/Sunday Take-down – August 20st and 22nd

As many volunteers as we can get are needed during the day on Friday and from 5:00 PM on Sunday. Responsibilities include taking tickets at the entrance doors, tearing the ticket in half, depositing one half in the box, and giving the second half to the guest. This position requires either sitting on a stool or standing. Requirements include a pleasant, friendly, helpful, courteous, and kind personality. At times, ticket takers are very busy. This is a very important position because ticket takers are the "first impression" that people get of our society.

Information Table – August 21st and 22nd



JULY

Two people are necessary for each 2-hour time slot. Responsibilities include answering questions concerning the show and providing information about our society's activities. Information attendants should be able to direct visitors and provide information about everything from who is in charge, to where a particular dealer is located. This position requires sitting at the information desk. The ability to be pleasant and helpful, without getting flustered, is important.

Junior Rockhound Raffle – August 21st and 22nd

drunk, smoking, or shoplifting), and report it to Show Chairman, Committee Chairperson, Armed Security. Show Security guards should NEVER confront or accuse anyone, ONLY report it. Greeting the public in a friendly manner is also important. This position requires walking around or standing.

Demonstrations – August 21st and 22nd





People are needed to demonstrate their skills during each 2-hour time slot. The area is large enough for several demonstrators to present simultaneously. This is the opportunity to greet the public and show-off by participating in beading, wire wrapping, chain making, or any other lapidary skills.

Silent Auction - August 21st and 22nd





One person per 2-hour time slot is needed. This position includes greeting visitors and Explain different auctions. Help set up an auction. Collect money from winners and make direct sales. A lot of fun, you get to see what is offered for sale!. This position maybe carried out while seated.
