# tips and tricks

### Installing 'sizing balls' in a ring,

Have you ever had a customer bring back a ring you sold them saying, "Well it fits my knuckle but it flops around my finger"? The problem is commonly caused by arthritis whereby the knuckle swells but the lower part of the finger remains smaller around. The solution to this problem is to install 'sizing balls'; small balls of the same metal as the ring placed at the 5:00 and 7:00 positions inside the ring band. This allows the ring to be slipped over the knuckle but helps to hold it in place during wearing. There are two ways to easily install the balls.

1). If the ring is plain metal or there is a stone(s) already in the ring, ensure that it is not heat sensitive (such as diamond, sapphire, ruby....most others are heat sensitive). Take an old chain (I always have old chains laying around the shop) and clip 2 or 3 links out of it, place them on your soldering pad and heat till they fuse into a ball. If they do not appear large enough, add a link(s) until they do. When they are the proper size, cut the same number of links and make a second ball. (Note, you can also make jump rings on a mandrel if you don't have an old chain – the results will be the same).

Now mark the 5:00 and 7:00 positions on the bottom of the ring shank with a Sharpie. Use a small ball bur and make a divot centered on the inside of the shank at the marks. Lay the balls on the soldering block, flux add a snippet of solder and heat until the solder flows onto the balls. Now flux the divots, warm until the flux whitens, holding the ring with self-locking tweezers place the balls into the divots and heat until the solder flows. Of course, never put a hot ring with stones in it into water or pickle as it will crack the stone(s). When cool, pickle, polish and you are finished!

If the ring has heat sensitive stones in it, try this method. Take a piece of 18-20ga wire and ball each end. Cut them apart. Be sure the balls are nicely formed and round. Mark the places where you will place the balls on the shank. Now, make a small divot on the outside of the shank opposite each mark and drill a hole that is slightly (slightly) smaller than the wire. Flux each ball and the shank. Now apply Kook-Jool to the stones or burry the top of the ring with the stones into wet sand or other heat absorbing material. Slide the wires into the holes (again, they should be tight but not so tight you cannot get them in), apply solder and heat. When cleaned up there will be no visible mark where the wires are.
