

Ten Rarest Gems on Earth (5 of 10)

5. **Painite** USD \$50-60,000/Carat









Once believed to be the rarest mineral on earth, painite is still considered very rare even today. It was first found in Myanmar (Burma) by British mineralogist and gem dealer Arthur C.D. Pain in the 1950s. When it was confirmed as a new mineral species, the mineral was named after him. For many years, only three small painite crystals were known to exist. Before 2005 there were fewer than 25 known crystals found, all numbered and accounted for, though more material has been unearthed recently in Myanmar. Painite has an orange-red to brownish-red color similar to topaz due to trace amounts of iron. It is very strongly pleochroic (showing different hues from different angles) and fluoresces a lovely green under short wave UV. The crystals are naturally hexagonal in shape, and, until late 2004, only two had been cut into faceted gemstones. Specimen No. 5 has been faceted into an oval and weighs 2.54 carats (far right picture, above). More recently, painite specimens have been discovered at a new location in northern Myanmar. It is believed that further excavations in this area will yield more painite crystals. Extensive exploration in the Mogok region of Myanmar has identified several new painite occurrences that have been vigorously explored resulting in several thousand new painite specimens. Most of the recent crystals and fragments are dark, opaque, incomplete crystals. A modest number of transparent crystals have been found and have been either saved as crystals, or, mostly, cut into gemstones. Originally, few of the known painite specimens were privately owned. However, the recent finds have become widely available to individuals.

Bet You Didn't Know.....

Arkansas Stone

Arkansas Stone, a form of Novaculite, is the traditional wherstone. Novaculite is chert, a form of quartz, composed almost entirely of silica in a dence mass of crystals. These stones come in four grades. Washita, a ping and white stone of 400 grit, is used to remove nicks in a knife blade. Soft Arkansas, a grayish stone of 800 grit, is good general purpose stone for finishing an edge. Hard Arkansas, is a white stone of 1000 grit, is strickly a fine finishing stone and will produce a superlative edge. Black Arkansas, relatively rare and expensive, is a polishing stone used for honing surgical instruments.
