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
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Konish: SLAs hide transfers of GRU ratepayer money to the City

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Letter to the editor

At their last meeting, the GRU Authority voted unanimously to forgive \$3 million in FY24 GRU losses on IT (NOT UTILITY) services provided to the City of Gainesville. This loss is not reflected in GRU's financial statements. It is an in-kind contribution from GRU to the City.

FY23, the GRU IT loss was \$4.5 million.

In the Auditor General's 2022 report on the City of Gainesville, GRU's IT and indirect cost allocation losses were approximately \$700,000 and \$600,000 in FY18 and FY19, respectively.

The GRU CFO and Chief Information Officer stated publicly at an Authority meeting that former CEO/GM Tony Cunningham had falsified the GRU IT "Full Cost Allocation Report," and Mr. Cunningham admitted it.

Cunningham's defense was that he had reduced GRU losses from the \$4.5 million in the previous year and planned to do more in future years.

GRU Service Level Agreement (SLA) losses on IT services involve only one of 42 identified "financial associations" between GRU and the City - but there are more than that. The vast majority of such "associations" are funded through an "interexchange fund" and are unencumbered by either an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) or SLA.

As GRUA Director Craig Carter has said, transfers are based merely on a "wink and nod." GRU and the City have refused to comply at all with my public records request in regard to this matter for a year.

Such a weak and dishonest handling of a very serious matter addressed specifically by both the Auditor General (see Finding 3) and HB1645 DOES NOT serve the pecuniary interests of either GRU ratepayers or employees.

In his brief stint as an Authority "Director," now-CEO Ed Bielarski abandoned a proposed three-year pause on the direct GRU transfer (Governmental Services Contribution) to the City and received the full support of Carter and Director Eric Lawson for his segue from unpaid Authority "Director" to well-paid GRU CEO/GM.

Sec. 7.02 of the City Charter provides:

""Service Level Agreement" or "SLA" means a contract entered into by the Authority that establishes a set of deliverables that one party has agreed to provide another". I agree with Ed that the solar feed-in tariff losses are not "SLA" losses – by definition. However, there are other tools available to the Authority to rectify this outrage.

The following partial list of GRU SLA losses are unidentified, not included in the Flow of Funds and are not noted in the 2024 GRU Financial Statements; as required by HB1645:

- 1. Collection and administration of many millions of pyramided dollars of City and County utility taxes and local option sales taxes WITHOUT CHARGE. GRU will lose approximately \$1 million when it stops bundling City nonutility stormwater and garbage fees into the GRU electric bill. Bielarksi was told to "make up" this revenue drop by Lawson, but failed to do so. I routinely find these taxes imposed on exempt GRU customers and obtain refunds going back three (3) years. GRU could easily find these billing errors without me but does not have the staff or incentive to do this.
- Provision of service to County fire hydrants WITHOUT CHARGE.
- Provision and servicing of County rental streetlight poles and fixtures in 2024 without billing the County at all, and without obtaining ANY FY24 payment from the City as agreed. This expense was belatedly deducted from the Direct Transfer to the City in FY25.
- Provision of GRUCom internet services to the City, County, and school board (the primary customers) below cost (GRUCom loses \$1 million on revenues of \$4 million).

5. Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP)

For more details, see my attached Alachua Chronicle post of November 17, 2024, titled, "SLAs Hide Transfers of GRU Ratepayer Money to the City".

The HB1645 focus on reporting of SLA losses flowed from Finding 3 of the 2022 State Auditor General's Report finding systematic falsification of Full Cost Allocation Reports (FCAPs, which can be criminal) that determine the flow of funds through an interfund exchange between GRU and the City SLA losses apply to in kind as opposed to the financial (Direct) transfers. Financial Statements are based only on financial transactions.

GRU's massive bond debt is secured largely by a pledge of future REVENUES, not physical assets. If there are excessive or concealed misappropriation of GRU resources, either direct or in kind, this becomes a breach of bond covenants. That undermines the bondholder's collateral.

Due to GRU deteriorated financial condition, HB1645 codified the bond covenants into the City Charter to prevent a technical bond collateral default. Authority Members, including former member Bielarski swore to abide by all of HB1645 – but have failed to do so.

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





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What's an SLA?

Per HB 1645 -

Sec "A contract entered into by the Authority that establishes a set 1.32 1/25 of deliverables that one party has agreed to provide another."

- It's virtually every contract GRU has executed since October 1, 2023
- In GRU's world the focus is intracity SLAs
- · They come in 4 types

There are County SLAs:

- Streetlights
- Fire hydrants
- Free administration of utility and local option sales tax
 - Broadband below cost
 - School Board: broadband below cost





What's Important About an SLA?

Any loss related to an SLA as defined by HB1645 must be part of the flow of funds required to determine the maximum cap on GSC

- The only SLA related loss was the IT SLA prior to FY2025 due to the City not agreeing to fund GRU's full cost of \$5.9 million (versus \$3.0 million)
- That \$2.9 million became part of the flow of funds that determined a \$14.699 million cap on the FY24 GSC

False. There are over 40 "Financial Associations" with the City alone involving millions in additional losses.



Given Finding #3 of January 2022, State Auditor's General Report, and HB1645, Note 1 to the FY24 GRU Financial Statement is misleading and incomplete.



Interfund Process

DESCRIPTION

GG and GRU bill one another for services the other provides for day-to-day business, GRU and GG both record the expenses for the items and bill as appropriate, ideally on a quarterly basis.

ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES Finance staff in GRU and GG keep track of what items need to be billed or reimbursed.

City refuse

Direct payments are sent often between GRU and GG. The latest FCAP allocated \$8,377 for GG's administrative journal entries.

RECOMMENDATION

For the foreseeable future, GRU and GG need to exchange funds. The current process is efficient and GRU should keep it as is.

For next FCAP, since both GRU and GG track entries, GRU should review both GRU's and GG's journal entry metrics to determine if this should be eliminated from FCAP going forward.

Tax Collection

DESCRIPTION

The City of Gainesville, Alachua County, and the City of Alachua all levy a 10% utility tax on electric, gas, and water charges. These tax revenues are passed directly to the levying authority and allowable by state statute. No administrative fee is currently charged.

For customers living inside Gainesville's city limits:

- Electric, gas and water: 10% city utility tax
- · Wastewater: no city utility tax

For customers living outside Gainesville's city limits:

- · Electric and gas: 10% surcharge plus 10% county utility tax
- · Water: 25% surcharge plus 10% county utility tax
- · Wastewater: 25% surcharge and no county utility tax.

GRU collects 10% utility tax plus a franchise fee for Newberry, High Springs and City of Alachua monthly/quarterly. For the City of Gainesville and Alachua County, on the monthly bill that GRU sends to those customers, the bills are paid and the utility tax sums are sent monthly to the City of Gainesville and Alachua County. If amounts are not ultimately collected from the customer due to failure of payment, GRU eventually recovers the bad debt when it is written off after seven years.

ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Each entity (city or legislative body) passes ordinances to alter tax amounts and alerts GRU to changes. GRU only collects money from current GRU customers in those areas.

COSTS

GRU does not charge an administrative fee and is solely a pass through.

RECOMMENDATION

GRU should continue to collect and transfer the tax collected to each levying authority (City of Gainesville, Alachua County, City of Alachua, Newberry and High Springs) for FY24 and FY25 without charging an administrative fee.

Dark Fiber/Network Connectivity

DESCRIPTION

GRUCom currently provides fiber telecommunications services to GG through contracted terms. Internet services are provided by three vendors: Cox, GRUCom and AT&T.

ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

GG pays market rates for GRUCom's network connectivity services, but does not currently pay for all fiber circuits.

COSTS

GG uses nine legacy fiber circuits to provide network connectivity to various GG sites that are not being billed by GRUCom. These circuits have a market value of \$1,915 per month. There is an additional transport circuit with a market value of \$992 per month. The total unbilled market value is \$218,724 annually.

RECOMMENDATION

needs for 10 unbilled circuits and recover the costs of service using the standard GRUCom Data Services Order MOU.

GG network connectivity represents an incremental revenue stream that offsets GRU's network costs.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

A potential \$218,000 of incremental revenue if GG continues to use GRUCom for network connectivity services.

Description: GRU and the City currently have a Memorandum of Understanding for Stormwater Management Utility (SMU) and Solid Waste (SW) Billing services. The SMU fees are charged to all owners or occupants of real property in the City based on an Equivalent Unit Rate and SW fees are charged to all residential owners or occupants of residential property in the City based on cart size. SMU and SW fees are collected monthly through GRU's billing system. This MOU will remain in effect until superseded by a more current MOU or termination by either party (GRU or COG). GRU is collaborating with the City to end the billing process by November 2026. This timing was advised by the tax collector.

Fiscal Note: The City pays GRU a fixed yearly fee for these billing services, \$800,786.78 for FY25.

Recommended Motion: GRU Authority hear a presentation and recommend GRU to continue to work with the City to remove these billings off GRU's bill no later than November 2026 given the scheduling requirements.

Transactions with the City

As an enterprise fund of the City, transactions occur between GRU and the City's governmental, and business-type funds throughout the year in the ordinary course of operations.

Below is a summary of significant transactions:

- Administrative services GRU pays for various administrative and certain insurance services provided by the City's governmental and business-type functions. GRU receives payment for Information Technology, telecommunications, certain insurance services, and billing services provided to the City's governmental and business-type functions.
- Pension obligation payments GRU makes payments to the City for pension expense obligations. See Note 14 Retirement Plans for additional information.
- Non-metered and metered service charges GRU receives payment from the City for all non-metered and metered service charges.

3. 2025-717 Recommendation to Seek Waiver from FERC's Independent Functioning Rule (B) Sept 10,2225 GRADING Anthony Memerka Newester Austonean Austonean

Department: Gainesville Regional Utilities/Energy Delivery

Description: Reviewing the applicability of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's (FERC) Independent Functioning Rule to GRU and seeking a waiver due to likely applicability and operational constraints.

Fiscal Note: Without a waiver, personnel compliance costs remain potentially burdensome (requiring multiple FTEs) and forbid common sense operational practices (e.g., cross training) to meet FERC's Independent Functioning Rule. GRU's current scale and structure make full compliance financially and operationally burdensome without a waiver. Legal costs to obtain a waiver are not expected to exceed \$20,000.

Recommendation: The GRU Authority authorizes the CEO or their designee to work with the Utilities Attorney and outside legal counsel to prepare and submit a request to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for a waiver from the Independent Functioning Rule, subject to legal review and approval as to form and legality.

2025-718 Sale of Cross Creek Water and Wastewater Systems (B) Department: Gainesville Regional Utilities/Water Wastewater

Description: Staff seeks direction from the GRU Authority to initiate a competitive process for the sale of the Cross Creek Water and Wastewater Systems, which are financially and operationally unsustainable for GRU to continue operating. The systems serve approximately 50 customer connections in the Cross Creek Mobile Home Park (CCMHP), a remote community located about 16 miles southeast of Gainesville. The systems are isolated from GRU's core infrastructure and require significant staff time and resources to maintain.

Fiscal Note: The CCHMP water and wastewater systems generate a combined annual revenue of approximately \$24,000 but currently cost GRU over \$294,000 annually to operate and maintain, resulting in a net annual loss of more than \$270,000. These costs include routine operations, maintenance, and overhead. Additional capital improvements will be necessary to keep the systems functioning. particularly due to operational challenges with the wastewater drainfield. Continuing to operate the systems will result in ongoing financial losses. Sale of the systems would mitigate these losses and relieve GRU of a long-term fiscal and operational burden.

Recommendation: The GRU Authority authorize the CEO or designee, to initiate and conduct a competitive process for the potential sale of the CCMHP water and wastewater systems, subject to legal review and approval as to form and legality.
