

The donated books will have the new Dallas/Fort Worth Area Council book plates inside the cover. The labels were designed by Southlake resident and member of the Southlake Area Alumnae Club Melanie Metzger. These labels will be used by all 10 alumnae clubs in the Metroplex. The labels will be placed in thousands of books donated to a variety of charities throughout the Metroplex.
