This year, the Alliance has seen over and over again the power of our community. We embarked on a brand new project to help raise funds for the Alliance. We called it Dancing with the Stars – Bay Area. What we never could have imagined became reality when 9 committed community members stepped up and made it a huge success! Without their dedication and investment in the Alliance, this kind of MAGIC would not have been possible.

This year, the Alliance partnered with a brand new class at Clear View HS created to help high school juniors and seniors build a solid foundation in preparation for the transition to adulthood. We reached out to community partners and asked them to share their wisdom and experience with these students. Some hosted students at their work place, others shared a lunch with a student while they discussed the future, and others came into the classroom to get to know the students and talk about life after high school. Without their dedication and investment in the Alliance, this kind of MAGIC would not have been possible.

This year, the Alliance saw the end of funding from the Texas Healthy Adolescent Initiative that supported the creation and sustainability of the SALSA program. This meant that the Alliance could no longer provide a staff member to oversee this program at Clear View. However, we saw more adult members than ever before. They helped with events, special projects and more. Without their dedication and investment in the Alliance, this kind of MAGIC would not have been possible.

This year, the Alliance grew to 8 local Take Back sites. With only 2 full time and 1 part time staff, we needed volunteers to help run the sites to ensure smooth events. More than 100 community volunteers stepped up this year to collect more than 3,800 pounds of drugs from local medicine cabinets. Without their dedication and investment in the Alliance, this kind of MAGIC would not have been possible.

So, you can see...our community truly is *an extraordinary power or influence seemingly from a supernatural source*. And, when the community comes together, MAGIC happens!

#### **Medication Take Back**

Since September of 2010, over **5,784 community members** have participated in eighteen Medication Take Back events coordinated by the Alliance in partnership with local law enforcement and the Drug Enforcement Administration. Thanks to the commitment of League City PD, Kemah PD, Webster PD, Lakeview PD, Friendswood PD, Houston PD Clear Lake Substation, Nassau PD, and Harris County Constable Precinct 8, there were **15** total Take Back sites this past year in the fall and spring. This initiative has helped to dispose of **21,769 pounds** of unwanted, unused, or expired medications since 2010.

To demonstrate an ongoing commitment to the health and safety of residents of the Bay Area, the City of Nassau Bay also has a Permanent Drop Box in their City Hall which provides a permanent option for medication disposal. The Alliance is currently working with Webster PD to install a permanent Drop Box in Webster as well.



# Juuling & Vaping

There is a new emerging and dangerous trend in our nation that is impacting the Bay Area directly. There are multiple names for them, but they're all e-cigarettes. The Alliance took this education on the road and spoke to district and campus staff, PTAs, civic groups, parents, students, and even took part in a Live Town Hall Meeting hosted by Clear Creek HS. Friendswood PD also videoed the presentation to be used in their Municipal Court.










#### On the Road for a Reason

#### Be the Reason



# SALSA (Student Adult Leadership Service Alliance)

As part of a grant from the Texas Department of State Health Services called THAI (Texas Healthy Adolescent Initiative), the Alliance began a Youth Adult Council called SALSA in 2014. This council provides equal voice to both youth and adults while addressing several risk factors including substance abuse, mental health disparities, and transition to adulthood. In FY 2019, this group consisted of 21 youth and 32 adults, and they have reached out to their peers during Red Ribbon Week and once again hosted Love Above Week, a week encouraging their peers to put Love above Hate, Violence, Apathy, Drugs, and Alcohol. SALSA also participated in the "My Intent" bracelet project this year. In January, each member chose a word for the year – to help motivate or guide them. This opportunity was also extended to all Clear View students and staff. Then, members worked together to hand stamp each bracelet.

This year, the program has been conducted in coordination with Texas A&M's Public Policy and Research Institute with SALSA serving as a Model Program. Through Texas A&M, two new sites are being formed locally in both Friendswood and Texas City ISDs.

They learned a lot about the work of the DEA and what they're doing to combat drug use and abuse throughout the world.
