


Post-16 Options

A simplified guide for parents and pupils

What options are there post-16?

After leaving secondary school there are 3 options:

- Get a job you do this in the usual way by finding jobs you are interested in and following the application process.
- 2. Get an apprenticeship this is where you are working but also attending a training provider like a college. You can get these through colleges and the workplace.
- 3. Go to college study A-levels, T-levels or other qualifications usually for 2 years. You maybe retaking GCSE's if you did not achieve a pass the first time around.




What needs to be done before any application is completed?

- Parents and children have a conversation about the 3 options and decide on which is best for them.
- The school will have already provided your child with at least 1
 meeting with a career's advisor. They will have provided your
 child with an idea of future plans they can use.
- Ask the following questions:
- What am I good at?
- What do I enjoy?
- Do I want/need to earn money now?
- Do I want to go onto further study at university post-18?



College Applications

- Decide on the course you want to do. Many college websites have search tools that can help you decide.
- Look at the websites of at least 2 colleges. Go to their Open Events. There is a list of all local Open Events on the school website in the careers section.
- Careers Information (portchester.hants.sch.uk)
- Follow the online application process for each college you want to attend. Make sure you apply for at least 2 colleges.

What to do before attending an open day:

- 1. Before attending any open event, please confirm the need to book, date(s) and times with the college or sixth form.
- Read through the prospectus to help you plan which courses you want to know more about.
- 3. Make a list of questions to ask.
- 4. Plan to create a positive first impression on the college staff you talk to at the event: one of them could be your future tutor!
- 5. Can't make an open event? Many colleges have virtual open days, tour videos and other information on their website, which are available all year round.

Please note: these dates and timings are correct as of 5th September 2024 and are subject to change – we would urge you to check the college website regularly, prior to attending.



• I have decided to take A levels in geography, biology and another subject linked to maths and want to look at City of Portsmouth College.


Use the drop down menus to choose courses to investigate







Click on APPLY to open up a page that shows you all the courses on offer.





Qualifications and predicted grades

- Each college application form will have slight differences, but they will ask you for the qualifications you already have or are going to take next summer. Make sure you choose the correct level. Most will be GCSE.
- When asked for a predicted grade most allow this to be left blank. If a grade is needed, you can include the target grade you achieved from your end of year 10 assessments.



Personal Statement

- The personal statement is used to give the additional details about you that are not provided by the GCSE subjects you take and other general information on the form.
- You include any clubs or teams you are a member of including sports and others like Scouts etc.
- Include any positions of responsibility like Senior Pupil.
- Include school teams you represent.
- Include any music and drama performances you have taken part in both in and out of school.
- Talk about going the extra mile and being comfortable working with others and independently.
